TEN CATR BROWER, the W/T stay-behind agent, was on very friendly terms with him and they kept up some sort of correspondence. Thought to be still at The Hague in 1944.

1945. ABEN, SD penetration and espionage agent, stated that SCHREIDER who was still at The Hague in December 1943, when ABEN himself was last there, lived, but did not work, in a building on the corner of Java Straat and Bee Straat, in the basement of which is a restaurant popularly known among the Germans as the "CASINO" or "SLOT CASINO". This building was formerly an apartment house, and is now entirely occupied by German officials of the SD. ABEN met SCHREIDER on several occasions, usually at meetings in connection with ABEN's penetration work, and it was he who insisted on ABEN smuggling the SD agent Piet KORT to Sweden.

Dear van Hoyland,

With reference to your letter of 5.2.46 concerning Joseph SCHREIBER, this man was arrested in Concentration Area No.5 at Scheveningen on 25.5.45. He was interrogated by the A.S.O. South Holland but conveyed the impression that he was withholding information and inventing answers. He was accordingly transferred to CSDIC (WRA) in the B.A.O.R. area on 3.7.45.

There are several comprehensive reports on SCHREIBER's activities, namely:

1. A.S.O. South Holland report R.16/1 of 21st June, 1945.
2. 21st Army Group Detachment CSDIC B.L.A. dated 29th July, 1945.

With reference to this enquiry by the Dutch authorities concerning the whereabouts of SCHREIEDER, this man was arrested in Concentration Area No. 3 at Scheveningen, Holland, on 25th May, 1945. He was interrogated by the A.S.O. South Holland but conveyed the impression that he was withholding information and inventing answers. He was accordingly transferred to CSIDIC (WEA) in the B.A.O.R. area on 3rd July, 1945, and there are three or four comprehensive reports now on this man's activities. It is my opinion that the Dutch authorities should apply in Holland through their Liaison to B.A.O.R. to be supplied with these reports of a man who is obviously of great interest to them. For convenience I give a list of these reports:

Dear Corin,

I would very much appreciate if you could assist me in the following matter.

I have been asked by authorities in Holland to find out the whereabouts of Sturmabführer Kriminalrat Joseph SCHREIEDER, Leader of German contra-espionage in Holland. He was taken from prison in Rotterdam by the Field-Security and is now either in Belgium or England. Certain information is required from SCHREIEDER, concerning the following:

"Two German Police-Superintendants, at present under arrest in Haarlem, have, independantly of each other, declared that SCHREIEDER on Sunday, the 17th May 1942, knew, that on the following day, Monday the 18th May 1942, a number of persons, several names of whom were already known to SCHREIEDER, would hide themselves on board the lugger "Sch. 164" at IJmuiden. (On arrival at the fishing-grounds, this lugger was going to set course for England by way of compelling the crew by force of arms to do so.)

Who informed SCHREIEDER of the above mentioned transport ?

We suspect that SCHREIEDER used a cadet-officer of the Netherlands East Indies Army, named Pasdelour, for this purpose and that the latter received the information from

(Pasdeloup; was arrested by the Germans on the beach at Scheveningen in February 1942, together with Dr. Wierdi Boeksten, one of the leaders of the Dutch Socialist Party. About April 1942 Pasdeloup pretended to have escaped from prison at Scheveningen. He was used by the S.D. to betray to them many of the leaders of one of the then-existing underground-organisations. About January 1943 Pasdeloup was shot in Amsterdam by cadet-officer Venneulen by order of Lt. Col. Dr. J.M. Somer, Chief of the Netherlands Information Bureau in London).

o.b. The lugger 13 persons were arrested, amongst others:

Kortland; harbourmaster at Rotterdam, Head of the Underground Movement of that city. Died in 1944 in concentration-camp Neuengamme.

Lt. Bill Roeske; was shot by the Germans early February 1943.

Lt. Wim 't Hart; was shot 24th June 1943.

Karel de Munter, electrical Engineer, escaped from prison at Scheveningen; is now in the Air-Force in the Dutch East Indies.

Lex van Os; is now in the Air-Force in the D.E.I.

I. PREAMBLE

1. During the war Prisoner was instrumental in capturing many Allied agents in HOLLAND and also in turning them. He maintains that agents thus captured were well treated by himself and his staff, and that he always worked to try to keep them in HOLLAND, as he realized that they could be of great use in the Punkspiele undertaken by the Germans. There was a certain amount of friction between Prisoner and DEFFNER, and Prisoner and the RSHA, as a result of which the ultimate fate of Allied agents seems to have been taken out of his hands. There seems to be no reason to suppose that he was responsible for any ill-treatment of captured agents, or for sending them to concentration camps in the Reich.
2. Prisoner has been cooperative under interrogation. He has an exceptionally good memory and it is considered that the info he has given is reliable.
3. On his release Prisoner hopes to return to BAVARIA and to find employment again in the original police.

While under interrogation on V-men in HOLLAND (see IR 48) Prisoner stated that he could add to the list of agents he had provided, if he were shown the Dutch "Signalementenblad". After studying "Signalementenblad" No 3 dated Aug 44, Prisoner recalls the persons listed below who worked for the Germans. Some of them did not work directly under him, but he had heard of them through GISKES, or from Sipo officials. The number in brackets after each name refers to the number of the description in the "Signalementenblad".

BERG Jan v d

Prisoner remembers that a v d BERG worked for GISKES, but knows only that he lived in AMSTERDAM, and is not certain which of the two given in the "Signalementenblad" is the man in question.

BOTTENWEG Dick

@ BENNEBROEK. Arrested 1943. Obtained money from underground organisations by asserting that he wanted to bribe Sipo officials to release captured persons. Offered his services as a V-man, and worked for Krim Rat HARDERS until end 44. Prisoner knows no details of BOTTENWEG's activities, but states that HARDERS mentioned from time to time that BOTTENWEG was unreliable.

BRANDON Moses  
(7)

@ BRAVO. Prisoner now remembers that this is the name of V-man 41 (see IR 48, para 35).

BRANDY George  
(189)

Prisoner confirms that this was an alias used by RIEDERHOF.

BRUGEN  
(444 a)

Maj in Police at AMERSFOORT, worked with Krim Rat THOMSEN, Aust ARNHEIL. Was shot in his house in autumn 44 by a German patrol owing to a misunderstanding. Prisoner states that BRINKMAN is the name of V-man 4711 (see IR 48, para 36), but is not sure whether 4711 is the same as No 260 in the "Signalementenblad", as he does not know the address of 4711. At the time of his arrest in 1942, 4711 was living in AMSTERDAM.

CANNO (or CANNE)  
(13)

Connected with Mevr PEKKELA and the arrest at end 42 or beg 43 of persons who were supposed to have transmitting sets. Prisoner spoke to CANNO once in connection with these arrests. He heard later from Mevr PEKKELA that CANNO was dead.

DE BRULJN Mij E J W  
(455)

THE HAGUE, Scheepmakerstraat 10b. As far as Prisoner remembers, the above was the address of Mij Elisabeth DE BRULJN, a secretary who worked for Abt IV BdS. She was Prisoner's secretary from 1941 until early 42, and from then until the capitulation acted as secretary to Mij. Prisoner states that she was never active as an agent.

HARGERS Ferdinand  
(38)

V-man of Abt WIEDERLANER, and later worked with FAT 365, DRIEBERGEN. Prisoner does not know how long he was active as a V-man; he heard of him for the first time at beg 43, and saw him for the first time in mid 44 in his (Prisoner's) office in THE HAGUE. Prisoner

KAPTEIN Gerard Simon  
(771)

saw HARGERS for the last time at HQ FAT 365 in DRIEBERGEN mid 44, or early 45. Police official. Prisoner was unaware that KAPTEIN worked with Anni van LEEUWEN, but states that they were both under FRANK.

KRAMER Vladimir  
(542)

Prisoner states that KRAMER and Jacoba MACKOW-MENSO worked for the Widerstandsreferat Bds THE HAGUE from 1943 onwards. Jacoba MACKOW-MENSO had already been employed for a considerable time at Police HQ in THE HAGUE and continued to draw her salary whilst agent. Prisoner states that she offered to work for him as an agent in early 44, but he declined her offer. At the time she was working for the NSV. In early 44 she told Prisoner that KRAMER had died. Prisoner believes that photograph No 51 is the KRAMER described as No 542.

Van LEEUWEN Anni  
(561)  
Van der MEER  
(572)

Prisoner states that she is identical with "Anni" described by him in IR 48 (para 33). A V-man whose name Prisoner had previously forgotten, who offered his services as V-man to Kria Kom KNOP and Kria Rat HARDERS. Prisoner remembers that v d MEER went with WEINBERG to contact someone in mid 44, and that, at this meeting WEINBERG was shot.

Van OORT A E R  
(595)

Prisoner states that van OORT was NOT an agent. RIDDERHOFF got into contact with him, and arranged for van OORT to billet the agent BRUTUS, who was dropped in BELGIUM, in his house at DOORN. Prisoner states that van OORT believed RIDDERHOFF to be working for the underground. Van OORT was arrested at the same time as BRUTUS.

PEGELS  
(606)

Identical with Dutch Pol Hptm PEGELS, Polizeipräsident THE HAGUE. Worked closely with Kria Rat HARDERS. From autumn 44 until the capitulation was active in Einsatzkde ASSEN (under HARDERS until beg 45, and then under Kria Kom PETRI). Prisoner does not think that PEGELS worked as an agent.

TEUNISSEN  
(652)

Capt PROYZE's servant girl was called TEUNISSEN; Prisoner believes that her father was a police official in THE HAGUE.



APPENDIX B

LIST OF SOB AGENTS CAPTURED IN HOLLAND

(Ref Memorandum from B 5 to A 2 for CSDIC (W.R.) dated 15 Dec 45 - PP 380.)

1. As the number of agents captured after the commencement of the NOORDHOLSPLEEL in 1942 increased, it was decided to hold them all in the camp at HAREN under Prisoner's immediate supervision. Regarding the treatment of these prisoners and their welfare, he states that he kept in close touch with the camp commandant, Krim Rat KÜTHE, Ausleiter WERTGENBOECH, and also with the adm offr, Krim Insp WICKER.
2. Two agents, whose names Prisoner can no longer remember, escaped from HAREN on 20 Aug 43, and at end Nov 43 van der GIESSEN and van RIETSCHOTEN also escaped. The Hüh SS u PF, SS Ogruf RAUTER, blamed Prisoner for these escapes, as van der GIESSEN and van RIETSCHOTEN were being held in HOLLAND after Prisoner had finished with them, in spite of the fact that RAUTER and HIMMEL had ordered them to be taken to camps in the Reich. According to Prisoner, RAUTER ordered the Chefrichter, Dr HEMTEL, to institute proceedings against Prisoner, as well as against the camp officers KÜTHE and WICKER. Although Prisoner was questioned several times on the matter, it did not result in court proceedings.
3. RAUTER, in agreement with HIMMEL and KALTENBRUNNER, ordered the agents to be moved to the Reich. Whilst it was being decided to which German camp they should be sent, they were to be put in the safest prison in HOLLAND. The agents were therefore transferred from HAREN to the prison at ASSEN about mid or end Dec 43. During Jan 44 the majority of them were sent to RAUTSCH; LAUWERS and JOCHALX were sent to GANLEIBUNG. Prisoner states that all correspondence with the NSL about the transfer of these captured agents to the Reich was dealt with by Reg Rat DEPFER, Abteilungsleiter IV. He states that he heard nothing more about the prisoners after their transfer to the Reich.
4. Prisoner is fairly certain that all the following were in the party sent to RAUTSCH:-
  - KIST (KARSL, WILSON)
  - MCCABE (MCKINS, MCKINS)
  - MCGY (COLEMAN, MOY)
  - OVERES (OOSAN, OUD)
  - ROUVELIET (PLUNCKER, PRINS)
  - POUWELS (PULG, PETERS)
  - Van STEEN (Van SITTARD, SWART)
  - ROUWERD (ROUVELD, ROUWELD)
5. Bob SIMA (SANDERS, Van SPANEN) was captured in Apr or May 44 with Bob COLGEE. SIMA was kept at HAREN until the camp was disbanded in Sep 44 owing to the advance of the Allied armies. The remaining prisoners were then taken to the Reich, but Prisoner does not know to which camp. The matter of their transfer was dealt with by DEPFER.

6. SIORCE (STERN, STERNING) This name means nothing to Prisoner. He states quite definitely that SIORCE was never arrested by the Sipo.
7. WEISIGER (ROYEN, RANDEK) Prisoner can remember nothing about WEISIGER. He suggests that if WEISIGER was arrested in ZWIST in Dec 44, then he was probably captured by SKIP FLAK, and if detained at SCHVEVENINGEN, then most probably interrogated by H.UTROCK.
8. Van der GIESSEN and RIETSCHOVEN Prisoner cannot say whether these two agents were executed at VUHT after being sentenced to death, or whether they were taken to the Reich. He can add nothing to the info given in IR 53, para 7.

APPENDIX C

MEETINGS BETWEEN LEADERS OF DUTCH RESISTANCE  
MOVEMENTS AND PRISONER AND ISPERT

(Ref Memorandum from B 3 to A 2 for OSDIO(WEA) dated 15 Dec 45 -  
PF 380.)

1. Reasons for calling Meetings

Prisoner states that these meetings were arranged to ascertain the causes of the increase in acts of violence in HOLLAND during the second half of 1944; these acts (committed by the Dutch) resulted in a corresponding increase of executions ordered by the HOh SS u Pf, Ogruf RAUTER. It was thought that an exchange of opinions would be of great help, and especially a discussion about a limitation of the distribution of arms amongst the members of the underground.

2. Decision to hold the Meetings

Prisoner suggested to DEFFNER that they should have discussions with authoritative representatives of the resistance movements. DEFFNER agreed and put the matter before the DSE (SCHÖNGARTH), who gave his consent. ELGMANN was sent to contact leaders of the resistance movements and arrange for them to be present. Prisoner states that the resistance representatives were assured personal freedom, safe-conduct and freedom from all supervision.

3. The Meetings

Two meetings took place with an interval of fourteen days, one in Dec 44 and one in Jan 45 (or possibly both in Jan 45), in the office of the HOh SS u Pf Ogruf RAUTER, THE HAGUE, Plain 1. The following were present:-

a) Resistance Representatives

De JONGE (possibly a cover-name)

De RONDE ( " " )

Pastoor KUYPER (Prisoner states that he knew Pastoor KUYPER played an important part in the LO)

A doctor from THE HAGUE (had a double-barrelled name which Prisoner cannot remember)

b) Germans

SS Stubaf ISPERT

Kris Kos FRANK

Prisoner

4. Prisoner states that DEFFNER was unable to attend the first meeting, as he had to go to a conference at Army Group HQ, but he attended the second one. At the second meeting, there was also a fifth Dutchman present.

5. Prisoner states that he opened the first discussion by explaining the reason for the conference, and asked the Dutchmen what they considered were the reasons for the increased activity. Reasons given were as follows:-

- a) The promise made by the Reichskommissar in 1940 that the political life of the country would be unaltered, had not been kept.
- b) Dutchmen were being called up to the Arbeitsdienst.
- c) Dutchmen were being made to work on defences.
- d) Confiscation of bicycles, bedding etc for the Wehrmacht.
- e) The poor food situation WEST of the River IJSEL.
- f) Ill-treatment of people detained at the camp in AMERSFOORT (put forward by De RONDE and confirmed by the Doctor).

Regarding the last point Prisoner states that he interrogated the "Lagerälteste" and the camp cook. Before the interrogation, the doctor (who attended the conference) was allowed to see them, and explain to them that complaints had been made and they should speak openly at the interrogation. Prisoner states that the results of his interrogation were forwarded to the SS u Pol Gericht for action. The question of arms and acts of violence was discussed, and a second meeting was arranged for a fortnight later, to give the Dutchmen time to discuss the problems with other leading members of the underground.

6. At the second meeting De JONGE read out the minutes of the previous meeting, and declared that the clearing up of the matters mentioned by the Dutch would form the basis of an agreement. De JONGE stated, too, that a control of arms and their distribution was planned. DEFFNER promised to put the minutes of the meetings (prepared by De JONGE) before the Höh SS u Pf and the Reichskommissar and to investigate the question of arbitrary confiscations, and the ill-treatment of detainees in AMERSFOORT. Pastor KUYPER brought up the question of distress in FRIESLAND owing to the shortage of food, and was assured that food transports to the area would be arranged.
7. It was decided not to arrange another meeting, but that either party could ask for one if they thought it necessary. The addresses of Pastor KUYPER and the doctor were known to the Germans, and through them a further meeting could be arranged at any time. No more meetings were held. Prisoner states that there was no intention of penetrating the underground at these meetings, and promises were made that the Dutch representatives who came would not be watched.

Copy of a letter from H.A.G. Baron Steengracht van Moyland, 82 Eaton Square, London S.W.1., to the Dutch Liaison Section M.I.5., on 5.2.46.

Herewith the letter we spoke about. I gather that the enquiry emanates from the Dutch Military Prosecutor at the Dutch War Office, The Hague.

Dear Corin,

I would very much appreciate it if you could assist me in the following matter.

I have been asked by authorities in Holland to find out the whereabouts of Sturmabführer Kriminalrat Joseph SCHREIENDER, Leader of German contra-espionage in Holland. He was taken from prison in Rotterdam by the Field-Security and is now either in Belgium or England. Certain information is required from SCHREIENDER concerning the following:

"Two German Police Superintendents, at present under arrest in Haarlem, have, independantly of each other, declared that SCHREIENDER on Sunday the 17th May 1942, knew that on the following day, Monday the 18th May 1942, a number of persons, several names of whom were already known to SCHREIENDER, would hide themselves on board the lugger "Sch. 161" at IJmuiden. (On arrival at the fishing-grounds, this lugger was going to set course for England by way of compelling the crew by force of arms to do so).

Who informed SCHREIENDER of the above mentioned transport?

We suspect that SCHREIENDER used a cadet-officer of the Netherlands East Indies Army named PASDELOUP, for this purpose and that the latter received the information from Wim 't Hart, who acted in good faith.

(PASDELOUP; was arrested by the Germans on the beach at Scheveningen in February 1942, together with Dr. Wiardi Beckman, one of the Leaders of the Dutch Socialist Party. About April 1942 PASDELOUP pretended to have escaped from prison at Scheveningen. He was used by the S.D. to betray to them many of the leaders of one of the then-existing underground organisations. About January 1943 PASDELOUP was shot in Amsterdam by cadet-officer Vermeulen by order of Lt. Col. Dr. J.M. Sasser, Chief of the Netherlands Information Bureau in London).

a.b. The lugger 15 persons were arrested, amongst others:

KORTLAND: Harbourmaster at Rotterdam, Head of the Underground Movement of that city. Died in 1944 in concentration camp Neuengamme.  
Lt. Bill ROESKE: was shot by the Germans early February 1943.  
Lt. Wim 't HART: was shot 24th June 1943.  
Karel de MUNKER: electrical engineer, escaped from prison at Scheveningen; is now in the air force in the Dutch East Indies.  
Lex van OS: is now in the Air Force in the D.E.I.  
Walter v. HELLENBERG HUBAR: Erickson Telephone Company at Gilze-Rijen, Holland.  
Sjef de Groot.  
2 Jailers from Utrecht, Holland.  
2 Jews from Amsterdam.

HOW & ON PENETRATION OF ALLIED INTELLIGENCE

PERSONNEL IN HOLLAND

(The material contained in this report amplifies OSBIC (NL) Interim Reports 53 and 48 and provides information requested by OSBIC (HOLLAND). The officers of IIC Mission were present at the interrogation.)

A. REIDERHOFF and the NOODPOLSPIEL

1. Prisoner does not know when REIDERHOFF was in jail, nor when he contacted there. He saw REIDERHOFF for the first time in Mar 42, when REIDERHOFF was present at the first capture in the NOODPOLSPIEL. The agent captured was LUTENS, who was sent to REIDER. AT traffic in the NOODPOLSPIEL began with LUTENS, whose arrest was made possible by an operation carried out by Lt Col NEDERLANDS: the OD was penetrated by LENO, KUP and REIDERHOFF, and Capt van der BEEK and LUTENS were captured on the same day.
2. At the interrogation of LUTENS the following were present: WOLFF, GISKIS, REIDERHOFF and Prisoner. KUP acted as interpreter. Prisoner states that LUTENS declared that he was willing to continue sending. T. GONIS, the next capture made after LUTENS, was arrested quite independently by the Sipo.

B. Allied Agents dropped in HOLLAND

3. JOORDAN  
In May or Jun 42, three suspects were arrested by the Sipo in the Café Terminus, WILMIE. One of them was in possession of a notebook containing telephone numbers. Through a WILMIE telephone number it was possible to contact JOORDAN: contact was made through van der BEEK, and JOORDAN's arrest followed in ROTTERDAM. JOORDAN was interrogated by WILMIE.
4. Van der BEEK  
Van der BEEK and Ter LIND were captured together in Dec 41. Prisoner states that, as far as he remembers, van der BEEK was interrogated by M.Y. and declared that he was ready to continue transmitting. Only a few messages were sent and no reply was received.
5. DESSING  
Prisoner states that after DESSING had been warned by ANTONIEN of the trap set for him by the Sipo, and had managed to escape, the Sipo lost touch with him completely. Van der BEEK was sent to try to contact him, and learned in ANTONIEN that DESSING had escaped to BELGIUM. Prisoner heard nothing more of DESSING, and states that he is unaware that DESSING had been arrested in BRUSSELS.
6. MOLNAR  
MOLNAR was dropped together with ANTONIEN. MOLNAR's body was found two or three days later; according to Prisoner he died of injuries sustained as a result of the jump. The fact that it was

ROLDWALD's body was revealed when LEWIS was captured and interrogated. Prisoner cannot say who handled the burial.

7. Van RIETSCHELDEN and van der GILBEN

Both van RIETSCHELDEN and van der GILBEN were arrested as a result of the NOORDPOLSPILL, as far as Prisoner remembers at end 42 or beg 1943. They were interrogated by MEY, and sent to the Camp at ELZEN. In early Nov 43, they escaped from ELZEN, but were re-arrested through contact being made with them by KIP and another V-man, whose name Prisoner cannot remember. He states that LINDMANS was not connected with this arrest. Prisoner believes that van RIETSCHELDEN and van der GILBEN were attempting to get to ZWOLLE to bring espionage material back to ENGLAND; KIP informed FRANK that they would be travelling from ROTTTERDAM to ROOSDRECHT on a certain train, and FRANK and some of his men captured them on the train. Prisoner believes that after their re-arrest they were interrogated by FRANK about the espionage material found on them, and by MEY regarding their escape. Prisoner remembers that they were sentenced to death, but cannot say when. Courts martial were arranged by DEPNER in conjunction with Oberkriegsgerichtsrat Dr BRUGER, who was on the staff of the Wehrmachtbefehlshaber HOLLAND.

C. Promises made to Captured Agents

8. Prisoner states that GISSEL promised LEWIS that nothing would happen to him provided he worked for the Germans and continued to transmit. He also promised that the lives of any agents caught subsequently would likewise be spared. A similar promise was made to JOOBMAN by WOLFF.

9. Many Agents after capture were interned at ELZEN, but there were four or five escapes from this camp, and as a result about fifty were evacuated to ASSEN at the end of the NOORDPOLSPILL. In 1944 several detainees were transferred to camps in the Reich (eg REITZICH). Prisoner cannot say what was considered to be the "Lagerstufe" of these arrested agents in concentration camps. He states that the Sipo in HOLLAND wished to keep these agents in HOLLAND, but the matter was taken out of their hands by Ant IV. Prisoner believes that DEPNER could give more details on this subject. He states further that Graf MULLER, Ant IV, was fully in the picture about the promises made in respect of the lives of captured agents. Later (Prisoner can give no date) GISSEL wanted to have LEWIS and JOOBMAN back in HOLLAND, but they were in the concentration camp at GRANDEBURG, and the NSA would not release them, though HEPPEL was sent to GLANZBURG to try to negotiate their release.

D. Documents

10. Prisoner states that copies of documents relating to cases of captured agents were sent to FRANK, Ant IV WOLFF, and to GISKES, Ant NEDERLANDER. In 1943, at the close of the NOORDPOLSPILL, the originals and any copies which they had kept at THE HAGUE, were packed and sent to ELZEN. Prisoner states that when he was on leave in Aug 44 the DBS ordered that all these documents should be burnt; on his return from leave, he was informed by MEY that this had been carried out on DEPNER's orders.

11. Prisoner believes that copies of the NOORDPOLSPILL cases were also kept at THE HAGUE in boxes labelled "Schakke Reichsarchief", and that in Sep 44 when the DBS staff moved to ZWOLLE, these cases were taken with the Registry. Prisoner states that these documents were destroyed in Apr 45.



B. Courts Martial

12. Prisoner confirms the statement of HENTZ, Chef Richter, HGH SS und Pol Gericht HOLLAND, that no Standgerichte or SS und Pol Gerichte should have been held for Dutchmen after Aug 44, unless they were in the Wehrmacht or OZ. Prisoner remembers that whilst he was in ZWIET between Jul and Sep 44 DIEPFER visited them and mentioned that executions had taken place in VUELT. Prisoner does not know how many were sentenced to death, nor whether the sentences emanated from courts martial or Standgerichte. He states that HILSCHEID and SCHNEIDER were stationed at VUELT in 1944, but is unaware that they took part in any courts martial. SCHNEIDER was Gefängnischef, Rechtsmeister and Leiter des Gefängnisses in SCHEVENINGEN from 1940 to approx Jul 44. About Jun 44 it was decided to move the prisoners at SCHEVENINGEN away from the coast, and all personnel were evacuated to VUELT. HILSCHEID and SCHNEIDER were both in VUELT until the Germans withdrew from there.

F. Sipo Officials

13. FRANK Kommando

In Sep 44 when the Aussenstellen became Aussenkommandos, Referat IV C 1 was formed into a Sonderkommando to carry out espionage WEST of the River Yssel. As far as Prisoner can remember this Kommando consisted of about ten persons, including FRANK, Karin Selzer BAUER and Karin Selzer WILPERT. Prisoner believes that no concerted plans for escape were made; he remembers that FRANK fled, but states that FRANK was not connected with Unternehmen DUNSCHE. Prisoner saw FRANK for the last time on 6 May 45; FRANK had rung up the Sipo office to say that he was going underground. KOLITZ and Prisoner, therefore, went to meet him in the Hotel Provenance in THE HAGUE. FRANK was wearing a sailor's uniform, and promised them that he would return. KOLITZ and Prisoner returned to the Sipo offices, and some hours later, when a sailor came to collect a suitcase, which he said was for IRKOWER, there was still no sign of FRANK. KOLITZ and Prisoner again went to the Hotel Provenance, and learned that FRANK had left in a truck for DUN WILDER. Prisoner states that FRANK spoke Polish, and thinks he may have tried to get to Russian-occupied territory, where his family was living.

14. GRALIN

Prisoner believes that GRALIN was formerly a policeman in DÜSSELDORF; he can no longer remember which cases GRALIN dealt with, but does not think he did much interrogation. The main interrogator in the Widerstandssektor was BERTS.

15. HUIROCK

HUIROCK was an interrogator; Prisoner confirms that HUIROCK had no V-men working for him in particular.

G. German V-men

16. HUGLIN

HUGLIN was connected with the arrest of von ALSEM at the Château Bleu in THE HAGUE. He worked as a V-man for FRANK (see IR 48); but Prisoner states that as he also helped Dutchmen who were under arrest, the Germans were never really certain of his reliability.

17. REVELL (Jewne or Janny)

Prisoner states definitely that REVELL worked for Det ABSTELAN (see also IR 48); he does not know her address. Her activities were directed by the German police official GUSCOLOTTI, who worked in the

sabotage section, against CS VI. Prisoner states that REWELL was in no way connected with the capture of KRUTUS (Hans Gerd); according to Prisoner, the latter was penetrated by REIDBERG, and was arrested when trying to leave the house where REIDBERG had got his lodgings.

18. CELOSSE Penetration

Prisoner heard from GISSIS that LINDEMANS was working for him under the designation "C", and states that "C" submitted information on the agent Bob CELOSSE and his collaborators in AMSTERDAM. The Sipo, too, had got into touch with this group through other channels, and although LINDEMANS did not lead directly to the arrest of CELOSSE, Prisoner states quite definitely that LINDEMANS penetrated the CELOSSE organization. LINDEMANS was shot at and wounded in Feb 44, and as a result could play no further part in the penetration of CELOSSE, who was arrested in Apr 44. Prisoner states that V-arn 4711 (see IR 48 - he now remembers that 4711's name was KRIMMELING) made contact with CELOSSE, and also introduced BEND, who maintained the contact.

A. V-LEUTE OPERATING IN HOLLAND

The following V-Leute operated in HOLLAND, working for members of the D&S staff THE HAGUE, or for the Wehrmacht (Abwehrstelle NIEDERLANDE). Those already mentioned in Report 21 AGP/DIC/D/CI/24 dated 29 Jul 45, are repeated here, as a fuller description is given.

Prisoner states that he was not well acquainted with the V-Leute of the Widerstandreferent and Sabotagereferent, but thinks that he has included all the more important ones.

1. ARNO (or ARNAUD)

German national; had served in the French Foreign Legion before 1933, and spoke fluent French. Later, he had lived in HOLLAND and learnt Dutch. Prisoner does not know how long ARNO had lived in HOLLAND.

Activities with Abwehr

Although a German, he was not granted "Wehrwürdigkeit" in 1940, owing to his service with the French Foreign Legion. He therefore offered his services as a V-man working for Ast NIEDERLANDE. Towards end of 1942 was sent to BELGIUM and FRANCE by CISES. As far as Prisoner knows, ARNO was granted "Wehrwürdigkeit" in early 1944, joined the Wehrmacht, and was employed by Ast NIEDERLANDE as an Abwehrgehilfe. Prisoner saw him for the last time in Dec 44 in ZWOLLE; at the time ARNO was wearing uniform.

Description

About 38 years old; 1.68 m tall; slender; fair hair, parted; blue eyes, pale face; pointed nose; looks and behaves like a writer. Married; latterly lived in AMSTERDAM. Prisoner thinks it possible that ARNO's real name was CHRISTMANN.

2. BODENS

German national; went to HOLLAND at an early age, and so learned Dutch and could speak various Dutch dialects.

Activity with Abwehr

Worked in one of the offices of the Reichskommissar (SEYSS-INQUART) at THE HAGUE as an interpreter from May 40, until he joined Oberlt GIESKES about the beginning of 1942, and worked for Ast NIEBERKLANKE III F. As far as Prisoner remembers, BODENS, KUP (para 14) and ARND (para 1) all took part in the "Nordspiel", and were connected with the arrest of LAUWERS. Prisoner saw BODENS in DREIERBERGEN or ZWOLLE in Nov or Dec 44, when BODENS was working under KLESEWEYER, and saw him for the last time about 10 Apr 45 in HAREN near GROWINGEN at Funkpoststelle NORDWEST (Leiter Hptm der Schutzpolizei and SS Haupt LIENHARDT). Prisoner thinks BODENS was sent there to contact FAT 365. He was an Uffz.

Description

About 35 years old; 1.84 m tall; broad-shouldered; normal build; oval, reddish face, broad chin; blond, thick, parted hair; blue eyes; calm bearing, talks slowly and quietly. Prisoner thinks his parents live in LIEBORG.

3. BREED

A Dutchman employed in the latter half of 1943 in the offices of the DGS THE HAGUE, where he did clerical work, and was paid as a police official.

Activity with Abwehr

Began his activities as a V-man about beg 44, and was played, inter alia, against Bob CRICOSSE. Was directed by Kria Kom FRANK, and worked mainly against the LKP. Prisoner saw him nearly every day until Jul 44, either in FRANK's office in the Binnenhof, or in the DGS Mess. He saw him for the last time in the Mess at THE HAGUE in Jan 45.

Description

About 25 years old; 1.67 m tall, thin build; thick, dark brown hair, combed back; oval face, brown eyes; hooked nose. Married a Dutch woman at end 44, and lives in THE HAGUE.

4. DALEN

Captured. See MI 5 Camp 020 Report, dated 6 Oct 44.

5. DROOG, Jonny

A Dutchman who was active before 1943 in an underground movement. About 10 Mar 43, he was captured at the same time as TACONIS, near ARNHEM, and handed over to Prisoner for interrogation. Kria Rat THOMSEN, Leiter of Aust ARNHEM had already informed Prisoner of DROOG's willingness to work as a V-man, and so DROOG was sent back to ARNHEM to work for THOMSEN. Prisoner cannot remember whether DROOG offered his services after his arrest, or whether he was already collaborating when the arrest was made. Prisoner saw DROOG for the last time at a small village NE of ARNHEM at end 44. DROOG was then wearing SS uniform.

Description

About 48 years old; 1.70 m tall; thin; lean, wrinkled, round face; bald head, sometimes wears a wig; pointed nose; talkative, but speaks nervously. Prisoner does not know whether DRÖGG is married. In 1943 he owned a small inn in a village near ARNHEM. Has a brother called Carlmann.

6. EDERVEEN

Activity with Abwehr

Offered his services as a V-man about the middle of 1943, and worked for the Widerstandssektor under Kria Kon KNOP. Prisoner saw him for the first time in KNOP's office, Binnenhof 20, THE HAGUE, in Jan 44. At beg 44 he was shot at near ARNHEM and wounded in the shoulder. Prisoner saw him two or three times, when he (EDERVEEN) came to see KNOP, for the last time about Jul 44.

Description

About 35 years old; 1.78 m tall, thin; dark (black?) hair, parted; oval face. Similar appearance to the agent Anton van der WAAL, for whom he was often mistaken. Lived with his mother in THE HAGUE.

7. PASTERHOUT

A Dutchman, who, as far as Prisoner knows, previously belonged to Polizeipreidium THE HAGUE. Joined the staff of Bds THE HAGUE as a police official in 1940 or 1941.

Activity with Abwehr

From about mid 42 was active as a V-man together with his school-friend WESZMAL, mainly in the Schleusungsorganisation. From the beginning of 1943 onwards was directed by Kria Kon FRANK. Prisoner saw PASTERHOUT for the last time in the Bds mess at THE HAGUE.

Description

About 26 years old; 1.75 m tall; thin; fair hair, parted; longish, pale face; pointed nose; pointed chin; grey eyes; when walking leans slightly forward. Married at beg 45 and lives in THE HAGUE; keeps to himself.

8. FEIGER

A Dutchman who worked as a clerk in the Bds offices from 1941 onwards. From 1942 he worked as a V-man for various Referate of Abt IV, and from beg 44 only for Kria Kon FRANK. Prisoner states that he was shot and killed by a member of an underground organisation in Jan 45.

9. FOURE

A Dutchman, who from 1941 worked as a driver on the Bds staff at THE HAGUE; offered his services as a V-man in 1943, and worked for FRANK in an espionage organisation. He, together with a German Kriminalsekretär, was shot and killed

on 15 Aug 44 by a member of the Underground in a village in FRIESLAND.

10. GEELEN

A Dutch photographer from EINDHOVEN.

Activity with Abwehr

Prisoner does not know when he began his activities as a V-man, but knows that he worked for Hptm VIERMEYER, Aust EINDHOVEN of Ast NIEDERLANDS. Prisoner saw GEELEN for the first time in early 1943, when VIERMEYER brought him to THE HAGUE on duty. In mid 43 GEELEN was arrested by the Sipo, Aust 'SIEBRACHENBOSCH, and imprisoned in LAREN. He had obtained 10,000 Gulden from the relative of a detainee by promising to effect the latter's release. Prisoner saw GEELEN for the last time in May or Jun 45 in prison in ROTTERDAM, where Prisoner was also in custody.

Description

About 40 years old; 1.82 m tall; thin; long head; long, sagged face; black hair, combed back.

11. GELECKE

Former Dutch police inspector in AMSTERDAM, and a Capt in the Dutch army.

Activity with Abwehr

Worked for Ast MÜNSTER before 1940; in May 40 was vigorously attacked in Dutch newspapers for supplying Ast MÜNSTER with Dutch uniforms. After the German occupation of HOLLAND, he joined the SS with the rank of Hptstuf. Early in 1941 he reported to Reg Rat Dr HÄNGER, Leiter Abt IV THE HAGUE, for whom he worked for some time as a V-man. Prisoner states that his services as a V-man were dispensed with at end 41, as he achieved nothing. Prisoner heard that GELECKE had joined Landsturmeinheit NIEDERLANDS in 1944, and that in 1945 he was again working for Ast MÜNSTER. Prisoner saw him for the last time in 1941.

Description

About 47 years old; 1.82 m tall; full figure; thick, grizzled hair, combed back; round, full face, black eyebrows, dark eyes; broad chin; cleanshaven; immaculately dressed. Fond of drinking, and was often with women of ill-repute; also a suspected homosexual. Known to Frau PESKEMA (para 18).

12. HAGMANN

Rich Dutchman from THE HAGUE.

Activity with Abwehr

Prisoner believes that HAGMANN had some connection with Abt V THE HAGUE regarding black-market transactions. About mid 43 Krim Rat WERNIK (Leiter Abt V) placed him at the

disposal of Abt IV; until the capitulation HAGEMANN worked as a V-man for Karin Kaas FRANK, and helped in the arrest of German deserters. Prisoner states that HAGEMANN always tried to ease the lot of Duteemen under arrest. In Jan 45 he arranged a meeting between the Dutch Underground leaders and Prisoner and Abt L IV. Prisoner saw HAGEMANN for the last time in early May 45 in FRANK's office.

Description

About 55 years old; 1.78 m tall; broad, full figure; little hair; broad flabby face; thick nose; big ears; pouches under the eyes; double chin; cleanshaven, married; lives in THE HAGUE.

13. HAGER

Lived in DUTCH EAST INDIES for many years before 1940. Policepräsident THE HAGUE 1940 - 42 (or beg 43); relieved of this post by RSh SS u Pf Obergruf RAUTER, owing to his addiction to drink. Prisoner states that HAGER worked with PROTZE (Orkol Richard). Prisoner only saw him once or twice in 1941. Prisoner heard that he had been arrested early in 1945 and taken to GERMANY on RAUTER's orders.

Description

About 50 years old; gray hair; portly build.

14. KUP, Willy

A German, who had lived in HOLLAND for a number of years before 1940, and kept an inn.

Activity with Abwehr

From 1940 onwards worked for Ast NIEDERLANDE III F as a V-man. Became a chief V-man directing the activities of other V-Leute from a "Town office" in THE HAGUE or ASSTERDAM. Prisoner saw KUP for the first time at the beginning of Mar 42 in connection with the arrest of LAUWERS. He met him several times in GIESES' office and saw him for the last time early in 1944. In 1944 KUP directed the activities of two Dutch V-Leute, who later worked for Ast WILHELMSHAVERN.

Description.

About 40 years old; 1.65 m tall; broad, heavy build; black, close-cropped hair; round face; brown eyes.

15. LENGUIS

A Dutch police official at THE HAGUE.

Activity with Abwehr

Worked as a V-man for PROTZE (Orkol Richard), and undertook journeys for him to the Spanish frontier. Prisoner saw him several times in the boss in 1944 and for the last time in May 45, when LENGUIS was working at Aust THE HAGUE as a police official.

44 years old; 1.80 m tall; broad; grey, thinning hair; round face, grey or blue eyes.

16. LINDEBINS, C.

A Dutchman from ROTTERDAM, known as V-man 'C'; @ Christian BRAND. Captured; see MI 5 Camp C20 Report, Dec 44.

17. PASDELOUP

Was chief messenger for the OD Staff, and was captured by the WGLD in SCHEVENINGEN with other members of the OD at end of 41. In the course of interrogation, he declared he was ready to work as a V-man, and Reg Rat WOLFF arranged for his "escape" in early 1942 (see also para 34). PASDELOUP then worked as a V-man in the OD, but in Mar or Apr 43 failed to keep an appointment and Prisoner heard nothing more of him. Prisoner was present with WOLFF at PASDELOUP's interrogation and in autumn 43 made appointments with him, or sent SLAMMER (para 26) or POOS (para 19) to see him.

Description

30 years old; 1.74 m tall; slim; fair hair, parted, oval face; grey eyes; clean-shaven. Engaged to a half-Jewess.

18. PEEKEMA, Dolly

A Dutch woman who had lived for many years in the DUTCH EAST INDIES. Her third husband was PEEKEMA, an official in the Dutch Colonial Ministry; he went to ENGLAND in 1940 with Queen WILHELMINA, and was for a time Dutch Colonial Minister in LONDON.

Activity with Abwehr

Offered her services as a V-person in May 40 to Krim Kom Dr OGILVIE, Aust THE HAGUE. When OGILVIE was transferred to BERLIN at end 40, he handed PEEKEMA over to Prisoner. Prisoner states that she had a bad reputation, as both she and her daughter Bobby (from her first marriage) had affairs with sundry German officers. Although the reports she brought to Prisoner were useless, he was ordered by the BdS Dr HARTNER to keep in touch with her, in order to prevent her from being a burden to other German Dienststellen with her reports. Early in 1943, Maj Dr KRATZER, Leiter I of Ast BRUSSELS approached Prisoner and asked if he could send her to SPAIN, to contact her husband in order to obtain information for Ast BRUSSELS. She went to SPAIN on KRATZER's behalf two or three times, but without success. Later, owing to her relations with German officers, the Wehrmachtbefehlshaber Gen CHRISTIANSEN ordered her to leave HOLLAND, and Ast NIEDERLANDE sent her to KRATZER in BRUSSELS. Since that time (end 43) Prisoner has never seen her. Her daughter is said to have married a GAF Capt from EAST PRUSSIA.

Description

46 years old; 1.72 m tall; slim, good figure; black hair (sometimes dyed red); round face; brown eyes, small nose; slight streak of Indian blood; well-dressed. Lives at THE HAGUE, Nychoeklaan 22. /7

19. FOOS, Leo

1940 in the Dutch police. In 1940 went to the Sipo, and in addition to his work as a police official, acted as a V-man, together with SLAUGHTER (para 26). Returned to the Dutch police in mid 44 and was employed on the Director-General's staff as Adjutant and Referent for ME. Prisoner saw him for the last time at ZWOLLE at end 44, when Prisoner visited Aust (Einsatzkommando) ZWOLLE.

Description

44 years old; 1.89 m tall; thick-set, black hair, parted, round face, brown eyes; round chin, thick lips; large hands. Married, and has eleven children; lives in THE HAGUE.

20. POEPEL

A Dutchman from AMSTERDAM. Worked for Ast BRUSSELS, Dr KLINGENBERG, Abt II. Came to Prisoner's notice, because he was arrested several times by Austs in HOLLAND and was released after referring his captors to KLINGENBERG. Personal description impossible, as Prisoner has never seen him.

21. REBEIL, Jeanne (?)

Arrested at bag 42 because of her activities with a sabotage group in the AMSTERDAM area, and after her arrest agreed to act as a V-Person for Ast AMSTERDAM. She is a Jewess. Prisoner has never seen her; he only knows of her from reports issued by Krim Rat LAGES, Aust Leiter AMSTERDAM.

22. RIDDERHOFF

A Dutchman from ARNHEM.

Activity with Abwehr

Worked for Ast NIEDERLANDE from 1940 till May 45, and was directed by GISKES from 1941 onwards. RIDDERHOFF worked mainly in the OD until the latter half of 1942, when GISKES sent him to BRUSSELS to work against the "WHITE BRIGADE".

Description

About 55 years old; 1.74 m tall; thick-set; large head with close-cropped, grey hair; red face, drinking type; thick nose; lips. Prisoner saw him for the second and last time in the office of GISKES. He was always known as George (Sohoroch); was several times punished for theft, and often lost money gambling. Prisoner does not know RIDDERHOFF's wife's address, but he heard from GISKES that RIDDERHOFF often travelled from BELGIUM to AMSTERDAM.

23. ROBERTS

As far as Prisoner knows ROBERTS worked for PROTEE from 1940 - 43. ROBERTS and his wife were issued with Canadian passports by Ast NIEDERLANDE. In 1943 he was detained for a short time, because he talked too much about the "Nordpolspiel". Prisoner only saw him once in 1943 at the time of his (ROBERTS') detention. Prisoner is not sure whether ROBERTS was used by PROTEE or by Ast NIEDERLANDE after this incident.

24. SALBERG

An Austrian, who became a naturalised Dutchman some years ago (date not known). Was employed in the Stab ROSENBERG of the Reichskommissar THE HAGUE, from 1940 onwards. From about mid 43 was also active as a V-man under FRANK, working mainly in the GDN. Prisoner only saw him once in Dec 44 in FRANK's office.

Description

About 40 years old; 1.66 m tall, thin; light brown hair; oval face; very active and talkative. Related to HILM, a rich Dutchman who was connected with SS Staf van der WAAI, Kria Kria AIRENS and Kria Kria HINGFUSS.

25. SAVENLJE

A criminal investigator in the Dutch police. Since 1940 worked on the staff of BGS THE HAGUE, and in addition to his executive duties was also active as a V-man. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel". As a V-man was at the disposal of any Referat of Abt IV. Prisoner saw him for the last time in early 1945 at EINSCHADE in an Einsatzkommando under Kria Kria KNOP.

Description

About 48 years old; 1.76 m tall; thin; thick brown hair, parted; round, furrowed face; blue eyes. Lives in THE HAGUE.

26. SLACHTER

Obit in Dutch police. Together with POOS (para 19), attached to the Sipo Abt IV in mid 40. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel", and was active as a V-man. Prisoner last saw him on 4 or 5 May 45 in THE HAGUE.

Description

44 years old; 1.88 m tall, thin; dark brown hair, parted; narrow, thin face; pointed chin, dark eyes; very deep voice. Married, has three or four children; lives in THE HAGUE.

27. Van EYK

Dutch police official. Attached to BGS THE HAGUE from 1940 until the capitulation. In addition to his executive work, was also active as a V-man and, as such, was at the disposal of any Referat of Abt IV. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel". Prisoner last saw him in early 1944, but heard that after Oct 44 he was working with an Einsatzkommando in ASSEN.

Description

About 40 years old; 1.67 m tall; dark, slim; oval face; very excitable. G RIFCES (Prisoner can not say whether ROBERTS or RIFCES was his real name.)

24. SALBERG

An Austrian, who became a naturalised Dutchman some years ago (date not known). Was employed in the Stab ROSENBERG of the Reichskommissar THE HAGUE, from 1940 onwards. From about mid 43 was also active as a V-man under FRANK, working mainly in the GDM. Prisoner only saw him once in Dec 44 in FRANK's office.

Description

About 40 years old; 1.68 m tall, thin; light brown hair; oval face; very active and talkative. Related to HEBEL, a rich Dutchman who was connected with SS Ustuf van der WAAI, Krijn Koen ABERENS and Krijn Koen HINKFOSS.

25. SAVENIJE

A criminal investigator in the Dutch police. Since 1940 worked on the staff of Bds THE HAGUE, and in addition to his executive duties was also active as a V-man. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel". As a V-man was at the disposal of any Referat of Abt IV. Prisoner saw him for the last time in early 1945 at ENSCHEDE in an Einsatzkommando under Krijn Koen KNOP.

Description

About 48 years old; 1.76 m tall; thin; thick brown hair, parted; round, furrowed face; blue eyes. Lives in THE HAGUE.

26. SLAGHTER

Oblt in Dutch police. Together with FOOS (para 19), attached to the Sipo Abt IV in mid 40. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel", and was active as a V-man. Prisoner last saw him on 4 or 5 May 45 in THE HAGUE.

Description

44 years old; 1.88 m tall, thin; dark brown hair, parted; narrow, thin face; pointed chin, dark eyes; very deep voice. Married, has three or four children; lives in THE HAGUE.

27. Van DICK

Dutch police official. Attached to Bds THE HAGUE from 1940 until the capitulation. In addition to his executive work, was also active as a V-man and, as such, was at the disposal of any Referat of Abt IV. Belonged to the reception committee in the "Nordpolspiel". Prisoner last saw him in early 1944, but heard that after Oct 44 he was working with an Einsatzkommando in ASSEN.

Description

About 50 years old; 1.76 m tall; dark hair combed back; round, pale face; cleanshaven, moves slowly. Was divorced or separated.

28. VERKIND (senior)

Pol Inspektor in Dutch police. From 1940 - 45 worked with BGS, and in addition to executive work was active as a V-man, and belonged to the reception committee of the "Nordpolspiel". Prisoner last saw him in early 1944, when VERKIND was imprisoned for theft. Just before the capitulation he was serving with Einsatzkommando AMBLO.

Description

52 years old; 1.70 m tall; normal build; grey hair, parted; longish face; pointed chin; slightly aquiline nose; sometimes wore a moustache. Family lives in THE HAGUE.

29. VERKIND (junior)

Wachtmeester in Dutch police. Attached to Sipo THE HAGUE from 1941. Worked as a clerk and also as a V-man. Prisoner last saw him in EWOLLE in Mar 45, where he reported before returning to the Dutch police.

Description

25 years old; 1.74 m tall; thin; light brown hair, parted; oval face, pointed chin; brown eyes; cleanshaven. Married a daughter of Leo POOS (para 19) about mid 44.

30. VILTOR

A Dutch police official at THE HAGUE. Worked for FROEZE (Onkel Richard) and travelled for him to the Spanish frontier.

Description

Impossible, as Prisoner has never seen him.

31. WESEMAL (or WESEEMAL)

Dutchman from AMSTERDAM; a toy-merchant.

Activity with Abwehr

Offered his services as a V-man about mid 43, and worked under FRANK until May 45, mainly in Schlüsselsange-organisations. He was first brought to Prisoner by his school-friend PASTENHOUT (para 7). In 1944 he was wounded in the lung and scrotum, and in early 1945 was shot in the lower jaw. Prisoner last saw him at end of Jan 45 in the Flatgebouw Willemspark, where all members of the Sipo at THE HAGUE were billeted.

Description

26 years old; 1.82 m tall; athletic figure; oval face, broad chin; light brown, wavy hair, combed back; scar on chin; erect carriage. Fond of sport, especially sailing.

32. WILLENRA

Dutch police official. Attached to the Sipo in 1940 from Polizeipräsident THE HAGUE, and returned at his own request in Aug 44. In addition to his ordinary work, was also active as a V-man. Prisoner saw him for the last time in Aug 44 at ZEIST, where WILLENRA reported before returning to THE HAGUE.

Description

40 years old; 1.78 m tall; thin; light brown wavy hair, combed back; longish face; brown eyes; nervous bearing; looks like an actor.

33. Anni (surname unknown)

A nurse from THE HAGUE. About mid 43 she was arrested by Ast MAASTRICHT on account of her activity with a Sehlensungs-organisation. Declared that she was ready to work for the Sipo as a V-Person, and Prisoner sent her to THE HAGUE, where she worked under FRANK. In mid 44 she was shot at and wounded in her right elbow while at THE HAGUE. Prisoner last saw her in early May 45 in their new offices in SCHEVENINGEN.

Description

About 35 years old; 1.70 m tall; rather buxom, looks like a cock; fair, bobbed hair; full oval face; red cheeks; grey eyes; fleshy chin.

34. Wim (surname unknown)

Early in 1943 was arrested in the province of UTRECHT together with about thirty other members of a "terrorist group", name of which Prisoner cannot remember. After interrogation Wim declared he was willing to collaborate, and worked in various organizations directed by Krijn Rat HARMERS. Prisoner does not know how long Wim was active as a V-man; he saw him for the last time in their mess at THE HAGUE in mid 44. Prisoner heard that Wim was shot at and slightly wounded about end 44.

35. V-man 41

A Jew, name forgotten. Was imprisoned in SCHEVENINGEN end 41 - beg 42. Heard of PASSELOUP's (para 17) plan to escape, and assuming it to be genuine, reported the matter to OG prison. Abt IV, Reg Rat WOLFF, suggested that he, too should "escape" and work for the Sipo. He accepted this proposal, and was directed by Krijn Kool HARMERS. Prisoner states that in the last few months before the capitulation V-man 41 worked for Einsatzkommando ASSEN.

Description

About 45 years old; 1.67 m tall; slim; black hair; oval face; brown eyes; cleanshaven; moves quickly. Married, lives in BREYDEN.

36. V-man 4711

Prisoner thinks his name began AB.... Went underground, and told his friends he was an agent; in 1942 was arrested in a train in AMSTERDAM, when he was shot in the back. Prisoner saw him in prison several times, and finally V-man 4711 admitted he was NOT an agent, but had gone underground on account of some form of theft which he had committed. He offered his services as a V-man, was released end 43, and directed by FRANK until May 45. He quickly made contact with the RWV, and was also connected with the CELOSSE affair. Prisoner last saw V-man 4711 in Jan 45 at FRANK's billet in THE HAGUE.

Description

About 40 years old; 1.72 m tall; very thin; dark hair, parted; thin, oval face; thin nose, pointed chin; brown eyes; cleanshaven. Last lived with his family above the Café de la Paix (opposite the Vredenspelis), THE HAGUE.

37. Name forgotten

Worked from 1942 - 43 in the Judenreferat (Referat 4, Abt IV), and was arrested for blackmail in mid 43. He offered his services as a V-man to Irin Selz DARTELS (Widerstandsreferat) and on being released was active for some time in early 44. About Jan 45 he was again arrested on the orders of the SS and Pol Gericht in THE HAGUE.

Prisoner has only seen him once- in early 44, but states that he was about 30 years old; 1.70 m tall; thin; dark hair, oval face.

B. AST WILHELM SHAVEN

Prisoner states that this Ast also had V-men in HOLLAND, BELGIUM and FRANCE, but he cannot give the names of any of them. He believes they were under Kory Kap Dr MAYER, Leiter Abt III, WILHELM SHAVEN, who travelled frequently to HOLLAND, BELGIUM and FRANCE. For making contacts he used a former Kriminalbeamter from WILHELM SHAVEN with a name like ALDERMANN. Prisoner saw MAYER for the last time in EWOLLE at beg 45, when MAYER went to HOLLAND on a special mission for the Marine Oberkommando. Prisoner gathered that this was connected with the laying of cables.

C. INTERROGATION OF CAPTURED AGENTS

Prisoner did a certain amount of interrogation of captured agents, but as he was unable to do all the interrogations himself, he gave his subordinates a comprehensive questionnaire on which to work. He has reproduced this from memory, and a copy is attached as Appendix to this report.

APPENDIX TO INTERIM REPORT 48

DIRECTIVE FOR INTERROGATION BY ABWEHR OF CAPTURED AGENTS.

Like any other police interrogation, the interrogation of agents fell into two main parts:-

- (a) Personal and life history.
- (b) Interrogation to obtain the facts of the case.

In order to obtain certain basic facts from every interrogation, the following questions were used as a guide by the interrogators. Apart from these questions, which had to be answered fully, others to suit each individual case were put.

- 1) Length of stay in ENGLAND before the agent set out on his mission.
- 2) Had the agent fled from HOLLAND or where did he originally come from?
- 3) To which Resistance Organisation did he belong in HOLLAND?
- 4) What position did he hold in the organisation and what were his duties?
- 5) Why did he escape from HOLLAND?
- 6) When did he escape?
- 7) Name, description, last and probable present residence of refugees, who might, even if only temporarily, have gone with him.
- 8) Detailed description of escape route.
- 9) In which transit camps for refugees did he stay on his journey?
- 10) Did he meet any persons known to him in any of these camps?
- 11) What organisations or individuals aided him in his flight, either financially or by other means, eg providing him with contacts, etc?
- 12) When did he arrive in ENGLAND?
- 13) To which or by what British or Dutch officials did he report or was he expected on arrival? (Name and address of such officials and location of such offices including a description of the personnel employed there.)
- 14) Did he meet any Dutch or other refugees whom he knew personally at these places?
- 15) Did the agent, before being sent to a screening camp (Ueberprüfungslager), come into contact with any officials other than those he had reported to or was met by in the first place?
- 16) Name and location of screening camp. (Was it under English or Dutch supervision?)
- 17) Length of stay at the screening camp.
- 18) How many people of Dutch or other nationality lived in such a camp?
- 19) Did he personally know any of the inmates of the camp? If so, name, address and probable present residence.
- 20) Who interrogated him?
- 21) What questions were put to him?
- 22) Place of residence and occupation after he left the screening camp.
- 23) When, where, by whom and under what circumstances was he asked to become an agent?
- 24) When and where did he agree to become and sign on as an agent? (British or Dutch Office?)
- 25) What other persons, there for the same purpose, did he meet on that occasion? (Name, description, residence.)
- 26) After signing on, was he at once sent to a school for agents, or was he given a place to live in (flat, house) and told to await further orders? (Name and location of school or residence.)

- 27) Names and descriptions of any other persons with whom he shared a flat or house, during the writing period.
- 28) Were these people also waiting for further orders?
- 29) When was he first sent to an agents' school?
- 30) How and through whom did he get his orders?
- 31) By what means and by whom was he taken to the school?
- 32) Was he taken to the school alone or did he travel with others?

The number of schools attended by the agent were to be given in chronological order and for each school the following points had to be covered:-

- 33) Name and/or number of school.
- 34) Name of town, village, etc.
- 35) Other details of location.
- 36) Description of school building (external appearance, internal layout).
- 37) Name and description of OC and instructors. What subjects were taught by individual instructors?
- 38) The name under which agent was known at the school.
- 39) Number and names of his co-pupils (real name, any alias, nickname, term of endearment or school name). Description of his co-pupils. What does the agent know about the individual pupils?
- 40) Did he get to know members of any other course?
- 41) Details of school curriculum.
- 42) What was taught in each subject?
- 43) What were the practical exercises like?
- 44) What apparatus or materials were used for such exercises?
- 45) Give the daily routine from Reveille to Lights-out.
- 46) Length of time spent in each school.
- 47) Was the agent conveyed from school to school singly or with other pupils? If so, names.
- 48) Who was in charge of such transport?
- 49) Where did the agent live in the intervals between courses (schooling) if one course did not immediately follow the other.
- 50) If any of his co-pupils left in the middle of a course or did not arrive at the next school, give their possible employment.
- 51) Give description as in No. 39 of any newcomers to the school.
- 52) Where did the agent live after completion of schooling and before going on operations? (If he did not stay at a holding school.)
- 53) Which other agents lived with him?
- 54) With which British or Dutch authorities or officials did the agent come into contact before going on ops?
- 55) When and who handed the agent his written operation orders? When and to whom did he return these orders after learning them by heart?
- 56) Repeat verbatim such orders (orders to be written out by the agent by hand in the second person).
- 57) Did the agent have any knowledge of the orders given to other agents?
- 58) In connection with the first part of the agent's mission, did he get any addresses of contacts in HOLLAND?
- 59) Were agents supplied with contacts outside HOLLAND and if so, why?
- 60) Name and description of agents with whom he was to work. Were they already at work or were they to be dropped with him?

- 61) Date on which he commenced operations.
- 62) Had the agent been dropped or had he been sent ashore from a boat? (The latter method was no longer in use after Apr 42.)
- 63) Were British or Dutch officers or any other people present at the farewell dinner?
- 64) Name and description of any agent at these farewell dinners, (When did they go on operations?)
- 65) Who took the agent to the starting point?
- 66) Which other agents started the same evening in other aircraft? (Names, descriptions.)
- 67) Does the agent know anything else about the operational use of other agents?
- 68) Cover-name used by the agent while on board the aircraft.
- 69) Name, description and mission of other agents travelling on the same aircraft.
- 70) Exact time of start.
- 71) When and where were the agents dropped?
- 72) When and where and with whom had the agent been dropped?
- 73) Were any WT or IF sets dropped and where are they now?
- 74) If these sets were not used by the agent or agents, for whom were they intended?
- 75) Was it part of the duty of the agent or agents to deliver letters or parcels (disguised objects) to addresses given to him in ENGLAND?
- 76) Was the agent received in the dropping area?
- 77) What passwords did he have to exchange with the person who met him?
- 78) What was the text of his message reporting his successful landing? Did such message contain a check (control).
- 79) How was the report sent? By pigeon or by WT?
- 80) Where was the agent taken after he landed?
- 81) Where were any others who jumped with him taken?
- 82) Name used on the agent's personal pass.
- 83) Names used on other agents' personal passes.
- 84) Name used by the agent and his assistants in their WT messages.
- 85) Did the agent have a WT operator with him or did he transmit himself? In the first case did the agent have his own code?
- 86) Number and make of WT sets.
- 87) Name and location of the transmission site. Next time for transmission.
- 88) Brief description of basic code used (book-code, poetry-code, transposition tables, etc).
- 89) Brief description of other coding methods to be used by the agent (letter-code, Playfair, Flatsbestimmung).
- 90) The possible use of an agent's number or key cipher. (Detailed interrogation on WT technicalities and ciphers was done by officials of the Orpo and Kriminalobersekretär MAY-Controls).
- 91) How much money did the agent or agents carry and for what purpose was the money to be used?
- 92) Did the agent or agents receive any orders other than the written orders?
- 93) What did the agent do until his arrest and what part of his mission had he accomplished?
- 94) Had the agent collaborated with any resistance organisations and to what did this collaboration amount?
- 95) What channels for contacting his assistant were used by the agent and how could he get hold of his assistant in a case of emergency?
- 96) Number and contents of WT messages sent and received by the agent until his arrest. (Who drafted and encoded these messages?)

- 97) Name and description of any other agents whom he met after he had been dropped. (How could he get in touch with them?)
- 98) Did the agent contact any of his relations, eg parents, wife?
- 99) With whom, where and at what time has the agent appointments which he has not yet fulfilled?
- 100) Has the agent or his assistant received orders to return to ENGLAND within a certain time, or is he expecting someone from there?

Ref BLOW/ET/2,28(36) dated 8 Oct 45. The following report is compiled from interrogation material and written statements made by Prisoner. Other points in the brief are being dealt with and Prisoner's information on them will appear as separate reports.

THE DUTCH AGENT Anton van der WIL

1. SCHLEIER's first meeting with van der WIL.

At the end of 1940 or the beginning of 41 Prisoner was called to a meeting at the office of the then Abteilungsleiter IV, THE HAGUE (either Reg Rot Billa or Dr HILDE) and introduced to Anton van der WIL (Prisoner thinks the name was WILDS).

On this occasion van der WIL had been brought by Krij. Sok KONIG of Auspoststelle ROTTERDAM to give information which subsequently (Jan 41) led to the arrest of a Dutchman who had shot a German soldier, as far as Prisoner can recollect, in LONDON.

At the conclusion of the meeting van der WIL was handed over to Prisoner, who after that date was responsible for directing his activities from THE HAGUE, where Prisoner had his office.

2. Cases investigated by van der WIL whilst employed by Prisoner.

During van der WIL's investigation into the above-mentioned case he made contact with "Brother JOSEPH", of a monastery in HILSTED, who was an active member of a resistance movement. Van der WIL was responsible for this man's arrest early in 1941.

In summer 41 van der WIL penetrated a group of spies and was responsible for about six arrests. One of these was owned up in a inn at THE HAGUE, Nijverheidsche Plein.

(As far as Prisoner can remember van der WIL worked for the Willemstuntdaferret (Krij. Karl Bruno WOLFF) from the summer of 1941 until the end of that year. Prisoner does not know anything of van der WIL's activities during this period.)

Early in 1942 as a result of a 'Spied', van der WIL contacted the agent Jonkheer de JONGE. This agent, of the Dutch Büro Inlichtingen, landed by boat and was arrested in ROTTERDAM in Mar or Apr 42.

JONGE's accomplice Leonard POE, a member of an underground organization, but not himself an agent, was arrested with him, but escaped the same day from the BUREAU.

In connection with the arrest of Jonkheer de JONGE and Leonard POE, Prisoner cannot remember whether the IT agent HILDE was arrested on the same occasion or a few days later as the result of a further 'Spied' by van der WIL.

As a result of the three arrests mentioned immediately above van der WIL discovered another agent of the Dutch Büro Inlichtingen, named HILDE, who was working in LONDON. This agent was also captured in ROTTERDAM about Apr 42.

At the beginning of May 42, as a result of the Nordpolspiel, van der WAL was put on the track of the agent JOORDAN. Through a telephone number in R.L.W. he made contact with JOORDAN and was instrumental in his arrest, which followed a few days later.

KLOOS

At the beginning of Jun another agent named KLOOS who was drawn into the Nordpolspiel was arrested.

RAJON(?)  
GROUP  
Gen. ROELLE

About this time van der WAL had established contact with a spy group which was working in close cooperation with the OD. At the end of Jul 42, ten arrests were made. Prisoner has forgotten the names of those captured, but states that the leader of the group had a name something like RAJON. He came from THE HAGUE, had previously belonged to a Dutch diplomatic mission, and had worked for a few months for the ELBERG Criminal Police and also at some time for the Canadian Police. One of the men arrested gave information which led to a raid on the office of the Commandant in THE HAGUE. Arrests of several important persons were made. Prisoner believes that General ROELLE, leader of the OD, was captured as a result of this affair.

ONDER NOED-  
POLSPIEL  
AGENTS

In late autumn 1942, van der WAL took part in the reception of two agents in connection with the Nordpolspiel. He talked for about an hour with the agents on questions of importance for the Punkspiel, before they were arrested. As far as Prisoner can remember one of these agents had a big electric torch which he was to deliver in AMSTERDAM. In the batteries of the torch were concealed money and a personal pass. Van der WAL was put on to the address given to the agent, and the first contact led to the arrest of the intended recipient of the torch. He was an agent with a German name ending in - MEIER.

Van LOOY and  
Kees VORREIN

In autumn 1942 the first contacts were made with the journalist van LOOY in AMSTERDAM, through an address obtained from a message received in the Nordpolspiel. Through van LOOY, van der WAL came upon Kees VORREIN, the well-known Dutch Socialist leader, who was busy at this time with the setting up of a "Provisional Government" - independently of the OD. VORREIN had been living in hiding since Jul 40. Van TIEN, Director of the FOMM Works in AMSTERDAM, also belonged to this group. On 1 Apr 43 Kees VORREIN, van LOOY and about thirty other people were arrested.

BOMBER  
GROUP

Through van TIEN, van der WAL got into touch with a group of shipbuilding engineers (or students) who had blown up a German minesweeper at ROTTERDAM. They were arrested in ROTTERDAM about one hour before the time they had planned to blow up three other minesweepers (Mar 43).

JUEN and  
WEL Service

About this time a message was received in the Nordpolspiel stating that the engineer JUEN was to be contacted. Van der WAL was put on to this address. The Spiel arising out of this led to the winding up of the "WEL" Service (Jul/Aug 43).

Kees DUEHILL

In Apr 43 the student Kees DUEHILL, NOT an agent, but connected with a resistance group, was arrested as a result of van der WAL's contact with him; he had been very active in intelligence matters and had worked with the above-mentioned Leonard POT.

BEATRIX

In the early part of 1943, as a result of the Nordpolspiel the female agent BEATRIX was captured when landing. She was taking money and documents to the owner of the Bell shoe shop in THE HAGUE (in a side street off the Spui). Van der WAL followed up the contact and the owner of the shop was arrested.

3. End of van der WAL's usefulness in HOLLAND.

In the meantime the Underground Movement had become suspicious of van der WAL, especially through the case of Kees VORREIN (Apr 43). To cover up his traces it was announced that he had been shot in ROTTERDAM by an unknown person (May 43). The deception lasted only a few weeks.

After the Wia Service and the RT station in HELPERHOL had been wound up in Jul and Aug 43, and contacts via SWEDEN had been ascertained, van der WALLE was sent to SWEDEN to find out what contacts still existed there. At the end of Aug or early Sep 43 he went by cargo-boat to SWEDEN. The captain of this steamer, ABEN, was working for Abt VI (ABEN did not return from his next voyage to SWEDEN in the winter of 43). Through ABEN van der WALLE contacted the Dutch Intelligence Büro and he was promised other contacts for a later date. Van der WALLE returned in a few days, but no contacts were established.

This journey at the end of 1943 in reality marked the end of van der WALLE's activity. Even before the Wia arrests his photograph was being passed round and was well known to the Underground Movement. Thus he was "played out" and could not undertake any new operations within any reasonable space of time.

#### 4. Movements after end of 1943.

At the end of 1943 and in early 1944 van der WALLE was living in THE HAGUE under the name of van LINDEN, at a flat called 'Boschzicht' in Benedictenheutse St. Early that year he went to OUD LOOSDRECHT, near UTRICHT. About Jun 44 without the knowledge of the Dienststelle, and under the name of van LINDEN, he married Corry van VLIET(?) (real name Den HEED). Her father lived in WESSENAR, Rijksstraatweg, 100 or 102. When Prisoner moved to ZEIST in Jul 44, he was able to establish by visits to van der WALLE that his wife knew his real identity.

Early in Sep 44, he moved out of OUD LOOSDRECHT, where he felt unsafe. He had attempted without success to penetrate a small espionage group there. One attempted arrest in connection with it failed. After this, until end Sep, he lived in ZEIST, where Prisoner housed him in the strong-point of Abt IV.

Van der WALLE and his wife left ZEIST a few days before Prisoner went to ZWOLLE at end Sep. Prisoner arranged that van der WALLE should contact him again through the Abwehrstelle in ZWOLLE or ASSEN, but heard nothing from him. At the beginning of Dec 44 van der WALLE contacted Prisoner by telephone from Aussenstelle ROTTERDAM (Kriminalkommissar JIBERS), stating that in three days he would be with him in ZWOLLE, and would explain his long silence, but not until Jan 45 did he come to ZWOLLE with his wife. He then explained that he was living on a house-boat in the water area SOUTH of ASSERDAM, and would come back to work for Prisoner only if there was something to do. As he could not be used in ZWOLLE, he was sent to THE HAGUE, and put up in the Abwehr billet 'Willenspark', Zeestraat. In early Mar 45 he went away again, Prisoner believes to his mother-in-law. At end Mar he came back to ZWOLLE with his wife, but remained there only for a few days, after which he left to find himself somewhere to live in the GRONINGEN area.

Before his departure Prisoner brought to his notice a statement made by his brother-in-law, Den HEED, who had been arrested in the meantime because he had demanded 10,000 Guilder from the relative of an arrested man, maintaining that he could bribe a Sipo official to set his relative free. Den HEED declared at his interrogation that in Nov he had been invited by van der WALLE to his house-boat and had had to assist in sinking parts of the corpse of HESSEKOPF, a former servant of van der WALLE. On being questioned by Prisoner van der WALLE admitted that he had harbored HESSEKOPF because he had threatened to betray his whereabouts to the underground movement unless he paid him 20,000 Guilder. As van der WALLE was confused and kept contradicting himself, Prisoner told him that he would interrogate him more fully later at GRONINGEN.

On 12 Apr 45 van der WALLE came to HAREN with his wife, having discovered Prisoner's address through enquiries at Aussenstelle GRONINGEN. He told Prisoner that he had found shelter in a place SOUTH of GRONINGEN (which Prisoner identified on the map as ZUID LAGEEN). A

4. Prisoner states that after the NORDPOLSPIEL, which operated from 10 Mar 42 until Nov 43 (referred to as E-Spiel by the Sipo), six Funkspiele were started, none of which had any success (a chronological list of Funkspiele carried out in HOLLAND is given in the Appendix).
5. In accordance with directions from the RSHA, whenever agents were caught, the question of a possible Spiel had to be examined thoroughly. When the report of a capture was rendered, notice had also to be given as to whether a Spiel was to be attempted, or on what grounds a Spiel was considered impossible. If a Spiel was to be attempted, then a report was to be made on the proposed lines of the Spiel, and the contents of the first messages which would be transmitted. The RSHA then approved the Spiel and gave it a name.
6. In order to maintain regular times of transmission, messages of a general nature such as routine signal messages, notification of dropping points, etc. were transmitted without the previous authority of the RSHA. The content of these messages was later reported to the RSHA, and all messages had of course to follow the lines laid down or approved by that office.
7. If military or political material was to be used in messages, it had to be obtained from Abwehrstelle NIEDERLANDE and RSHA respectively. As far as Prisoner knows Abwehrstelle NIEDERLANDE (and after Jun 44 Frontaufklärung) had to have the material approved, originally by OB West, and after autumn 1944 by Heeresgruppe H. Prisoner states that he had no power to check the material supplied to him. He adds that he only made use of military material when the progress of the Spiel rendered it absolutely necessary, since the object of a Spiel was not to pass military information, but to facilitate the capture of further agents. Furthermore, the obtaining of material was such a complicated and slow process, and the material itself was so poor in quality and quantity, that its use was avoided wherever possible.
8. The messages dispatched in Spiel NORDPOL were written by Obstdt GISKES of Abwehrstelle NIEDERLANDE, but those in subsequent Spiele were written by Prisoner himself (with the possible exception of the first Spiel described below. Prisoner can no longer remember whether he or GISKES wrote the text for this one.)
9. The messages written by Prisoner were encoded by Kriminalobersekretär MAY or, under his supervision, by the WT agent involved. The set was operated by an official of the Orgo Funkmessstelle Nordwest (commanded by Pol Hptm LIENHARDT.)
10. The Spiele carried out were as follows:-
  - (1) Name forgotten

In early 1944, the agents BORSSUM-BUISSMA and LETTEBOER were arrested in AMSTERDAM. They were dropped at the end of 1943, and worked for the Ordsdienst (resistance movement) collecting espionage material. Prisoner cannot remember any details, nor the length of the Spiel (he thinks it was about two months), and does not know

whether the agents know about it.

(14) Spiel EGMOND

The following agents were captured in AMSTERDAM in Mar or Apr 44:-

Bob CELOMBE - sabotage agent  
Bob VEEN(?) - "Der Lange Bob" - WT agent  
SIPMA - sabotage agent.

Another sabotage agent belonging to their group had been arrested in ROTTERDAM fourteen days earlier, but Prisoner states that there was no connection between these arrests. CELOMBE was spotted because he was using his own house in which his wife was also living.

Bob VEEN(?) after interrogation declared that he was prepared to collaborate, and subsequently operated the set under the supervision of an official of Funkmess-stelle Nordwest. The Spiel, which was unsuccessful, lasted until about mid-Jul 44.

(141) Spiel SASKIA

In Jul 44 the bodies of two or three agents were washed ashore near WILDRINGEN on the ZUIDER ZEE; they apparently came from an aircraft which had been shot down. Prisoner cannot remember their names. It appeared from the passes and WT code documents found on them that they were to have been employed in HOLLAND.

In reply to the report rendered to the RSHA, it was suggested that the possibility of a Spiel should be considered. Prisoner thereupon made the proposal, which was approved, that a member of his Dienststelle should make use of the documents and of a WT set which had previously been seized.

Polizei Angestellter BLANKE, who had lived in CANADA for several years before the war and spoke very good English, seemed suitable for this task. The Spiel was, however, unsuccessful, and after it had remained in a state of suspense for several weeks was discontinued on instructions from the RSHA towards the end of Sep 44.

(iv) Name forgotten

In Apr or May 44 the WT station of the Ordedienst Buitenlandnets was raided in ZAANDAM (North HOLLAND). The operator, the proprietor of a radio business in ZAANDAM, was not an agent. Prisoner can no longer remember his name. A Spiel was attempted either with his WT set or with the set and documents of an agent captured in connection with this raid, but it only lasted a few weeks. Prisoner cannot remember the name of the agent, a half-caste Indian, nor any details of the Spiel.

(v) Spiel OLD DUTCH

This case did not concern a WT agent but a WT station of the Binnenlandnets of the Ordedienst. This net was set up by the Ordedienst in order to maintain communications

between provincial commanders (Gowestkomsmandanten) in the event of an invasion. The operators were not agents but technicians, and lived in HOLLAND. The importance of the net increased with the advance of Allied troops on Dutch soil, and the WT station in HENDROVEN became its central station.

A number of these provincial stations were raided at the end of 1944 and early 1945, as a result of EF carried out by Puncosastelle Northwest. Among those raided was the WT station at BERGPOORT, through which a Spiel was attempted. The Spiel only lasted for a few weeks as a new code unknown to the Germans was introduced. Prisoner cannot remember the name of the captured operator, nor whether he co-operated in the Spiel.

(vi) Spiegel BOVEN

In early Mar 45 SCHREIDER, a half-caste Javanese, Dutch citizen, civil engineer, about 27 years old, was captured near GROWINGEN. SCHREIDER had been dropped there by parachute in Nov 44 by the Americans. His job was to reconnoitre the German positions and strength East of the river IJSEL, from GROWINGEN to ZWOLLE, and to pass on information by RT to aircraft.

After SCHREIDER's capture an attempt was made to maintain the RT communication, SCHREIDER himself sometimes speaking. In all, about six conversations took place, and the dropping of a container of food which SCHREIDER had already demanded before his capture was also arranged. Owing to some technical hitch the last conversation at the end of Mar 45 failed.

In this Spiel, PAK 306 at ENSCHER (OC Major von FELDHAUSEN, prisoner at CSDIC/WEA) twice supplied a limited amount of military material. Only one lot of this material was ever transmitted; the interruption of communication prevented the passing of the other. Prisoner thinks that this material consisted of information regarding fortifications in the areas GROWINGEN and ZWOLLE, which was mainly true but was already known.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

11. Interrogation

Prisoner did a certain amount of interrogation of captured agents, but as he was unable to do all the interrogations himself, he gave his subordinates a comprehensive questionnaire on which to work. It has reproduced this questionnaire, and a copy will be attached to the final report.
