I return herewith the Progress Report in the case of GISKES and LINDEMANNS which you handed to me.

Some of the information given regarding LINDEMANNS is new to us. There had hitherto been no evidence that LINDEMANNS gave away or could have given away any Allied military plan. The theory that he had been responsible for passing information regarding the Arnhem operation was based on a mis-reading of the information from most secret sources. Nor were we previously aware of the fact that LINDEMANNS had been put in touch with agents who were parachuted into the northern Dutch province. The incident to which GISKES refers may well relate to the penetration of the organisation which S.O.E. attempted to set up in the spring of 1944, when the organisation which had hitherto succeeded was proved to be utterly penetrated. I am, however, somewhat surprised by GISKES' statement that the attempt to play back S.O.E. agents was immediately stopped in England.

An attempt was made after the arrest of LINDEMANNS to warn the S.O.E. organisation in Holland of the fact that his brother might be working for the Germans. I am not quite sure what signal was sent but so far as I can recollect it was not in the form described by GISKES. On the other hand, the guess that he was given away by another agent (no doubt VERLOCK) is of course correct.

I take it that you will be passing the relevant information to S.O.E., who will I think be most interested in it.

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PROGRESS REPORT

in the case of

Hermann GISKES.

5. 6. 45.

Investigation of this case commenced on 30th May 1945. GISKES has been an active Abwehr III officer since the Autumn of 1938, and the case is of such proportions that, up to the present, it has only been possible to skirt the fringes in very general terms. One aspect of the case, linked with HINTERHANN, and concerning the 'Nordpol' affair in itself requires special investigation, for which purpose S.O.S. has supplied the brief. It has not yet been possible to check the information which GISKES is supplying, and with this reservation, progress to date is as follows: -

GISKES, who by profession was connected with the tobacco trade, was put in touch with Abt-Hamburg in September 1938 by Major PEIDMANN. His application for employment with the Abwehr was accepted in November 1938, and he commenced duties with effect from January 1939, under Kptm. Dr. UECHEL of Referat IIIc 1, Abt-Hamburg, in the zone governed by General Abt 10. IIIc 1 dealt with reports covering General Abt. 10 zone, supplied mostly through official channels by the civilian population. There was constant liaison with Major PEIDMANN of Referat IIIc, whose main preoccupation at that time was the breaking down of English Secret Service organisations in Holland. Dating back to this period, GISKES recalls the following events in which he participated under orders from PEIDMANN: -

- " 1) A man of about 50 years of age who was set up in The Hague by IIIc to observe the English Stelle. He lived in The Hague and in the Summer of 1939 was sent under Abt-Muenster as Abt-Hamburg at that time headed over the running of Holland to Muenster. I received orders to go to Holland to obtain from him 2,500 Dutch florins which he was holding as an advance of pay. I could not get the sum and left after two days without results, after having introduced him to Major von ROSENBERG of Abt-Muenster, IIIc, who was to be in charge of him. We learnt later from Muenster that he had placed himself at the disposal of the English Stelle in The Hague.
- 2) A certain JAEGER, living at Nijmegen where he had a post-box belonging to Referat IIIc Hamburg. He was, as far as I can remember, also an agent of the English Stelle in The Hague.

The outbreak of war found GISKES attached to Abt-Juenster, where he was employed in forming and reorganising Abwehr III sections. January 1940, in conjunction with Hptm. CHRISTIANSEN, GISKES ran Referat IIIc. In this connection, he was employed to a certain extent with CHRISTIANSEN in clearing up a French Intelligence Service in Copenhagen, which was run through the French Commercial Attaché's office. GISKES visited Copenhagen in May 1940 to recover Abt funds which an Abt employee had embezzled. At the end of May 1940, he visited Milan to see one FUERSTENAU with whom a female IIIc agent of the Abt was living. The agent's name was RIEKE and she brought information about an English Intelligence centre in Leghorn, for which she was well paid. Another reason for GISKES' visit was the fact that information had been received from the German Consul in Genoa to the effect that a certain MEYER, who had arrived there, with family from England, had applied to FELDMANN for assistance. In the result, GISKES managed to assist MEYER in returning to Germany, after overcoming passport difficulties, and this man had then the intention of studying wireless. GISKES claims that he has no idea what eventually became of the man.

Mid-June 1940, GISKES was transferred to Abt-Paris to take over the duties of Referat IIIc 2 and remained there until August 1941. This section was responsible for all suspect spy cases in the greater Paris area and the Departments of Seine and Seine/Oise. Cases outside this area were passed on to the appropriate IIIc Stelle. On the average, the Stelle comprised 6/8 officers or Sonderfuehrer, with about 5 N.C.O.s as Abwehr assistants, and clerks, orderlies, drivers, etc. As part of Abt-Paris, the Hotel Lutetia was used for offices. For personnel, see APPENDIX I.

In a written report, GISKES states: -

"The clearing up of suspicious cases that became known were almost always attended to by V-Men of various kinds stationed in Paris; they were under instructions from G.F.P. officials, Sipo officials, and people from the Abwehr. My officers and Abwehr assistants had, almost without exception, one or several such contacts. These were, in the main, not completely trustworthy, working for money or other advantages, and sometimes moved from one German Dienststelle to the other. I refused in all cases to make personal acquaintance with such people, and can therefore not assist in their identification."

The Mayor of a small suburb (Montrency?) gave good information of a general political nature at the time. Also a Reichadsutscher called KRAUS, who was busy in Paris at the time, had good connections with French people and brought some good reports. Of the very numerous, but for the most part unimportant, suspicious cases, I can recall a few. For instance, the case of Mrs. DEEGAN of the U.S.A. Embassy in Paris. With the help of the Embassy secretaries, she had assisted English soldiers who were in flight in civilian clothes through Paris. These soldiers, or officers, were able to remain for longer periods in Paris before they were caught. They were tried in all cases as prisoners-of-war, and sent to prisoner-of-war camps. Mrs. DEEGAN and two secretaries of the Embassy were obliged to leave Paris after the case was cleared up.

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" At the same time a case cleared up by Referat IIIIf concerned an English Intelligence agent in the U.S.A. Embassy. Several spy cases were handed over to Referat IIIIf at the time I left Paris. I recall the name of a Marquis D'HAROCOURT. I do not know anything about the result of this case. "

Concerning BRAUS, GISKES will be interrogated in detail. Meantime, his statement on the man is attached at APPENDIX II.

In August 1941, GISKES was transferred to IIIIf Aast-Nederlandse, and his former duties with Aast-Paris were handed over to Major FRIEL. Between this date and the end of the year, GISKES was mainly preoccupied in reorganising the IIIIf section. In the Spring of 1942, the British W/T agent, LAUWERS, was apprehended, turned round, and played back. His arrest was brought about entirely by information supplied by one RIDDERHOFF to Uffz. KUP of IIIIf.

This was the start of the 'Nordpol' affair, which continued until the Autumn of 1943. In a statement, GISKES has written the following: -

" This modus operandi made it possible to continue the game until first three, then two of the 'Nordpol' prisoners escaped from Sipo detention, in the Autumn of 1943, and the game thereby became blown to the enemy. This led to a severe conflict, with a corresponding sharp exchange of letters, between C-in-C Holland and the Hoherre S.S. und Polizeiführer. The last of these letters from the Hoherre S.S. und Polizeiführer to the C-in-C Holland culminated in the suggestion that the Abwehr officer responsible for the affair, namely myself, was to blame for the fact that the matter had become blown to the enemy; "owing to the fact that, up to the present, he has obstructed sentence being passed on the prisoners." This exchange of correspondence took place at the end of December 1943 or beginning of January 1944. The continuation of my work in Holland was then, for all practical purposes, at an end and I came to the conclusion that the S.D. intended to have me locked up and disposed of in some manner. Help came to me in the middle of January 1944, when the creation of FAKs and PAFs from former IIIIf Dienststellen was ordered. According to this order, I had to form FAK 307, which was to be a type of regimental unit and not a Dienststelle. Brussels had been selected as the H.Q. of this FAK. With this order in my pocket I was able to cut away from Holland and as a Truppenkommandeur, was no longer under suspicion of the RSHA and dependent on its satellites in Holland. The remaining sections

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"of the military Abwurhstellen, including Ant-Niederlande, were taken over between the beginning and middle of 1944 by the Sicherheits-polizei, and the officers etc. so long as they were agreeable to the RSHA, whether they wanted to or not, were put under command of the C.O. of the local Sipo."

Personnel of the Sipo known to GISKES are: -

1. O.C. of the Sipo and S.D. in Holland during 1942 and 1943 - Standartenfuehrer, latterly Brigadefuehrer HARSTER. From the Autumn of 1943 onwards, his successor was S.S. Brigadefuehrer NAUMANN.
2. Leiter of Abtg. III for the whole Dutch area run by the Stelle in The Hague during 1943 and 1944 was S.S. Obersturmbannfuehrer DEPPNER.
3. Leiter of Referat IV/E was Obersturmbannfuehrer SCHREYERDER. This Section was connected with all matters dealing with espionage, cases of sabotage, and armed resistance.
4. S.S. Hauptsturmfuehrer KNOOP was amongst others employed under SCHREYERDER.

GISKES states: -

" From a Service point of view, I was actually only concerned with (3) SCHREYERDER, and occasionally in connection with the constant friction, with (2) DEPPNER.

SCHREYERDER was a calm 'kriminalrat' of the good old school who did not show the usual S.S. disposition, even though he did wear S.S. uniform. In the case of SCHREYERDER, I was always quite certain that prisoners who came within the framework of his own personal jurisdiction were not unduly roughly treated. KNOOP, on the other hand, who came under his command, favoured more of the usual S.S. methods. The Leiter of III, DEPPNER (see (2) above) was rather a typical S.S. product. Barely at the age of 30 he had a powerful position which contrasted unpleasantly with his lack of experience of life generally. Any sort of co-operation, whether on a Service basis or any other form, was quite impossible for me with this man, and the Section mentioned at (1) above."

For details and descriptions, see APPENDIX V.

Ant-Niederlande personnel, together with a note on the Funkbeobachtungs-stelle der Orco (W/T intercept), as obtained from interrogations of both GISKES and HUNDEMANN is attached at APPENDIX III.

During the course of his employment with FAK 307, GISKES came into contact with LINDEMANNS @ KING KONG. Separate data, as supplied by both GISKES and HUNDEMANN on this man is attached at APPENDIX IV, and it is interesting to note the claim that LINDEMANNS was responsible for supplying advance information to the PAF about the Allied airborns landings in the Arnhem and Eindhoven areas.

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Meantime, detailed interrogation is proceeding. As already pointed out, the dimensions of this case are extensive, and it is anticipated that some time must elapse before a complete report on the case can be made available.

APPENDIX II.

(Statement handed in by GISKES.)

In April or May 1941 I got to know KRAUS through Hptm. SCHADE of the Luftwaffe, who was known to me and came to Paris occasionally. If I remember rightly, the two men knew each other from their previous employment with the SIEMENS firm. In the course of a conversation with KRAUS, I got the impression that he had asked his friend to put him in touch with an officer of Abwehr III. KRAUS made rather confused statements about alleged espionage activities of one or two persons, who were in the habit of visiting the house of his fiancee, Daisy de BROGLIE, in Neuilly. At this, or a later conversation, he informed me that a certain Sonderfuehrer, then living in Paris, who had the occasion to meet Mlle. de BROGLIE at parties, had rather coarsely enquired of her: "Are you now prepared to work for the German Abwehr or not?". The name of the Sonderfuehrer was BERENBERG-GOSSLER.

From this also rather muddled account by KRAUS, I came to the conclusion that there was something not in order, from an Abwehr point of view, with this Mlle. de BROGLIE, and that KRAUS had been sent to spy out the land and find out whether and to what extent anything was known to the Abwehr. I ordered KRAUS to ascertain precisely what was going on regarding espionage in the De BROGLIE circles. In order to protect his former fiancee, and present wife, KRAUS made further enquiries within the circle concerned.

The results were serious. It was absolutely clear that a certain circle of well-known personalities in Paris had organised a spy net, which collected and analysed considerable material. In the de BROGLIE house in Neuilly, meetings and the collecting and sifting of material was taking place. To what extent Mlle. de BROGLIE overlooked the great danger she was running in so doing was not clear. Nevertheless it was obvious that action would have to be taken rightaway if I was to get her out of the business, as I had already promised KRAUS I would do. In June or July 1941, amongst others, COURTOIS and Pierre d'HARCOURT were arrested in connection with the affair. In this connection there were later a few further arrests, but I do not remember the names as, shortly afterwards, I was transferred from Paris to the Hague, and my successor, Major FKL, continued to work on the case.

In the following months I had somewhat of a tussle with Ast Paris about keeping my promise to the effect that the arrest of Mlle. de BROGLIE would be prevented. I met KRAUS several times later on in Paris, on occasional visits I made there, and socially was friendly with him. There was, however, no more talk of espionage or the Abwehr. His wife knows me as Dr. GERHARDTS and does not know that I had anything to do with the Abwehr or her case. As far as I am aware KRAUS was not kept au fait with the outcome of this espionage matter.

I have made the above report as far as I am able to recall the details, which took place four years ago. It is possible that I may have made mistakes about matters which are only of second-rate importance.

Stelle 'P' - Niederlands:

Stelle-P was the Dienststelle of Kapt. z. See Richard PROTZE. It was an independent unit directly under the command of Abt. III, section III-F, Berlin, but for administration matters it was attached to Ast-Niederlands. Its H.Q. were as follows:-

1940 - 42, Wassenaar near The Hague.
1943 Bildhoven.
1944 in the area of Nymwegen.

From September 1944 onwards the unit was incorporated within FAK 306, but from a technical working point of view was independent. Personnel of Stelle-P consisted only of Kapt. PROTZE @ ONKEL RICHARD, and an elderly lady who attended to his typing and ran the household. I do not know her name. She was generally called "Tante LEMB". Stelle-P never was considered to have any importance from an Abwehr point of view. In the Abwehr it was regarded as a circonference or "Bonbon" for the over 65 years old Kapt. PROTZE, who was still quite robust and a few good contacts.

PROTZE, as a retired officer, was already living in Holland in 1939. He was an old friend of Adm. CANARIS from their cadet days, and it was said that he had been an instructing officer. Allegedly PROTZE is the man who had developed the German III F service from its inception. Before 1939 he had worked for a number of years with Abt. III, Section III F, in Berlin. In spite of his age PROTZE was ambitious and was rather disappointed that he had not been made Q.C. of Ast-Niederlands. He had little contact with officers of the Ast. When one did meet him occasionally he gave the impression of being a charming old gentleman with whom one could converse, but one never heard a word from him about his service work.

In the summer of 1944, when Ast-Niederlands was dissolved or taken over by the Sicherheitspolizei Stelle-P was ordered to work together with FAK 307, with H.Q. at that time in Brussel. This annexation, however, did not take place on account of the evacuation of Belgium and Stelle-P then became attached to FAK 306. I last saw Kapt. PROTZE in the spring of 1944 in Bildhoven.

W/T intercept unit of the Ordnungspolizei in Scheveningen.
(Funkbeobachtungsstelle, or Fu-B-Stelle-Orpo) - Information given by GISKES.

"Task of this unit was the tracing of, and listening to, enemy W/T traffic. Establishing, by listening, of W/T agents traffic, reception of two-way traffic, and determining the call-signs, and other traffic signals. The tracing of local enemy W/T agents by RDF methods. Arresting W/T agents in conjunction with the Sipo. The results of the above missions were reported to III/f for the purpose of analysis from an Abwehr point of view. In establishing W/T 'play' with the enemy, all technical data for the reception and establishment of traffic was procured, or dealt with, by Fu-B-Orpo, and the traffic of the agents concerned, or the official appointed to carry this out, was supervised by Fu-B-Orpo. The Fu-B-Stelle received the text of the W/T messages from the Stelle which was running the W/T 'play', i.e. III/f or the Sipo.

Between 1940-1943 Oberleutnant der Orpo, HEINRICH, was the O.C., from 1943 onwards a Hptm (name forgotten).

The Stelle had roughly 30 officials at its disposition, the greater part being W/T and W/T intercept specialists. In 1943, H.Q. was transferred to Driebergen near Utrecht. In the autumn of 1944, a large portion of the technical material was lost in an air attack, near Zwolle, whilst it was in the process of being transferred to Northern Holland.

The unit was equipped with a fluctuating number of RDF cars. Generally speaking, however, there was only one at disposal. From 1942 onwards portable Nahmeiler (short range RDF sets) were operated, which are said to have produced good results.

Results obtained in the local RDFing of enemy W/T operators varied considerably. Sometimes the fixing of enemy W/T bases succeeded surprisingly quickly, in other cases many months often elapsed, and there were cases when no results were achieved at all. As a non-technical man the reasons for this are not clear to me. During 1942-43, on the average, two to three active W/T agent sets were continually under observation. This figure increased gradually from the beginning of 1944 onwards.

I estimate that from the summer of 1941 until mid 1944 about 12 enemy agent transmitters in Holland were recognised, pin-pointed and captured through the purely technical means of the Fu-B-Stelle. "

Statement by GIBSON

"At the end of 1943, IWM - Lille, offered III R - Holland for employment, a Dutch national who was said to have worked very well in Lille as a V-Mann. The man in question was said to be completely blown in the Lille area and was to be found employment somewhere else. The man was taken over by III R Art-Niederlande and was put at the disposition of Uffz. KHP. His name, and cover name, I can no longer recall to memory, but I would describe him as follows:-

About 1.60 m. tall, thin, pale complexion, sanguine appearance, about 30 years old, dark hair, dark eyes, piercing look and altogether rather a common criminal type.

I mistrusted the man very much and gave Mr orders to pass him off elsewhere at the first available opportunity. He had three fingers missing on one of his hands. He spoke French, German and Dutch and was knocking around Brussels in January 1944. In February 1944, he suddenly reported to KHP, that he had got to know a man, who for many years already had been working for the British Secret Service in Holland, Belgium and France. This individual would be unprepared, he said, under certain circumstances to place himself at the disposal of the German Abwehr, but not the police. At the first meeting with this person, whom Hptm. WURR and Uffz. KHP were present, he told them that for some years past he had been working for the British Secret Service. Moreover he said that his cover name in England was KING KONG, and his real name Christian LINDEMANS, from Rotterdam, at that time without any fixed abode. He produced a pistol and a pile of false, or falsified, Ausweise and travel permits of all descriptions. The reason for his offer to work with the German Abwehr lay in the fact that his youngest brother had been condemned to death in Rotterdam. He had arranged for his brother to co-operate with a Dutch underground movement, which was actively concerned in assisting allied airmen to escape. His brother had then been arrested and sentenced and he had to save him.

An examination of LINDEMANS' story proved the correctness of the statements concerning his brother. The immediate release and pardoning of his brother was thereupon put to him as the prospect. (As far as I got to know the brother was not free in the summer of 1944 and thereafter lived with a relation in Germany).

LINDEMANS, who was given the cover name CG, then made, in March 1944, comprehensive statements about persons and contacts in the British, Dutch and Belgian Secret Services in the respective countries, which mainly referred to passeur nets and organisations connected with escape routes. The case was principally attended to by Hptm. WURR. It transpired that a portion of the persons signalled by LINDEMANS were already known to other German Abwehrstellen. Against the majority of the persons signalled there was not sufficient evidence to permit immediate intervention. Others had already taken to flight, disappeared or were already under arrest. I do not know the names or the numbers involved, nor do I know whether, on account of these arrests, proceedings were taken.

The subsequent activities of LINDEMANS comprised principally three phases:-

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1. Contacting Dutch sabotage groups.
2. Contacting the Belgian underground army.
3. Contact with the English Secret Service after the Occupation of Belgium.

In regard to 1. LINDEMANS made contact, through connections in Amsterdam, with a group of agents who a short time before had parachuted into the Northern Dutch Province - I mean roughly about April 1944. On the basis of statements made by LINDEMANS, the Sipo arrested the group and attempted, without any co-operation with the Wehrmacht, to set up R/T traffic with England. The attempt, however, was quickly spotted in England. I cannot relate any more about this case and its extent, etc., as at that time, on account of the existing distrust of Simonbelian towards FAK and PAK, and especially towards my PAK, no reports of any description whatsoever were given to me. Snapshots from reports in small numbers case through; only then high military authorities demanded to be briefed, but then they were months old and no one any longer laid any value on them.

On the basis of statements made by LINDEMANS, two agents were caught in Rotterdam, who had already been arrested before in connection with the NOIMPOL affair, but who had later escaped from the HAARLEM camp. As far as I remember one of these was MINTONEREN. They were carrying important material in the form of films and were to have set out for England from Zealand.

During the course of a raid on Rotterdam, LINDEMANS was shot at and arrested by the Sipo, in May 1944 (?). He was "kidnapped" from the prison hospital 14 days later by Ufz. SP. The Dutch wardens assumed that he had been set free by Dutch Resistance circles.

In regard to 2:

Contacting the Belgian underground army.

LINDEMANS had many and excellent connections with the local regional leaders of the Belgian Resistance Movement. After his "flight" from Holland I gave orders that he would steer a course which would enable him to report about plans of the Belgian Resistance movement in general terms and the operations planned by Allied Supreme H.Q. At the start, and during the progress, of the Allied invasion of France much uneasiness was apparent and widespread at German Military H.Q.s in the West concerning the attitude, bearing, fighting ability and operations planned for the Resistance armies in France and Belgium. In this respect the FAK received strictest orders to clarify and appreciate the situation. In order to carry out his task and to give LINDEMANS the necessary confidence vis-a-vis his Resistance contacts the arresting of many Belgians, known to be participating actively, was waived. The reports provided by LINDEMANS, particularly towards the end of August 1944, were regarded by the competent authorities as good.

In regard to 3:

Contact with the enemy Secret Service after the occupation of Brussels.

During the last few days of August 1944, LINDEMANS instructions in this connection were to offer his services after the occupation of Brussels, in order to clarify the intentions of further enemy agent operations in Holland and Germany. He received orders to report to 1c of the nearest division, or army, after crossing the lines and to get himself passed on to the PAK or one

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of the PATs. About the 20th September, 1944, I received a report from PAT 365, H.Q.s Driebergen-Utrecht, to the effect that LINDEMANNS had been there, after having previously reported to the Ic of Fallschirm AOK I in Breda. Next day LINDEMANNS was slipped back through the lines at Eindhoven. My H.Q.s at that time was at Bornheim-Bonn. PAT 365 no longer came under my command - all communications were severed by the English attack on Arnhem. Thus it was only weeks later that I was able to receive incomplete reports concerning the contents of his reports. Roughly speaking those reports contained essentially the following:-

Reckon with an English attack, direction Eindhoven, timed for Sunday. Airborne troops, in large numbers, are in readiness to start.

There followed then a few unimportant reports about the situation in Belgium, politics and food situation.

In February 1945, I received a W/T message from PAK 306 which was operating in the Dutch area. According to this at the beginning of February 1945 an enemy W/T agent was arrested in Amsterdam, and a W/T message from his English control was secured and deciphered. The message dated back to end of November 1944 and read somewhat as follows:-

Warning, advise all friends, Christian LINDEMANNS is a traitor. He is in Allied hands.

From this it was clear that LINDEMANNS was blown, and his fate had caught him up. As regards the cause of his being unmasked I can only make conjectures and can make no definite statement.

According to what I heard from Holland, by chance, through Trupp 365 at the beginning of November 1944, the former V-Lenk of III F - Lille mentioned at the beginning of my report, through whose intermediary LINDEMANNS came in touch with the Abwehr, was sent on a line crossing operation and did not return. If he was caught it is possible that LINDEMANNS was betrayed by this man's statements."

(+) Note:

GIESKES has been asked to clarify this sentence. He states, however, that he is unaware as to whether the message was intercepted by the HORCH unit and deciphered, or whether the ciphered message was found in the arrested W/T operator and then deciphered with his assistance.

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APPENDIX IV (contd.)

Information obtained from HUNTEMANN on LINDEMANNS

On the 15th September, 1944, the Friday before the Arnhem landing, HUNTEMANN was with KIESWETTER in his office at Driebergen; at about 4.30 p.m. the telephone rang and HUNTEMANN heard KIESWETTER's voice "CC" and say he knew nothing about him. HUNTEMANN, knowing of "CC" as GISKES' best agent, interrupted and informed KIESWETTER of this. KIESWETTER, who, it appeared, was speaking to Ast-Hilversum, accordingly told them to send "CC" at once to Driebergen, and he was brought immediately by car. Before he arrived, HUNTEMANN had left and so did not see him at this time. Before he went, however, KIESWETTER told him that "CC" had important information and had asked for GISKES, who was then at Dordordt bei Bonn.

On the Saturday, 16th September, HUNTEMANN saw "CC" (LINDEMANNS) drive off at about 12 noon in a car belonging to K.P. 365, on his way to Eindhoven. HUNTEMANN understood that he intended to cross the lines near Eindhoven and to return in about a week's time. LINDEMANNS had been in Eindhoven prior to going to Hilversum (whence he had come to Driebergen) and had there been in touch with two employees of PHILIPS, with whom he was to get in touch again.

On the same day, 16th September, HUNTEMANN was told by KIESWETTER that LINDEMANNS had brought information about an allied air-borne action which was expected shortly in the Muenster/Duelmen area, but did not mention Arnhem.

This was all that HUNTEMANN knew at the actual time of the Arnhem landing. Later, in February 1945, GISKES spoke to him of LINDEMANNS, saying he was afraid he was dead and had probably been betrayed by NEULS (a minor agent with whom LINDEMANNS had worked). He spoke very highly of LINDEMANNS, calling him his best agent and saying that, compared with him, RIDDERHOFF was very small fry. He then told HUNTEMANN that LINDEMANNS had given him the information about the Arnhem landing; GISKES had apparently been very annoyed that he was not informed when LINDEMANNS came from Hilversum to Driebergen as GISKES would have come in distance to obtain information from him. It was HUNTEMANN's opinion that GISKES thought very highly indeed of LINDEMANNS.

HUNTEMANN then told how GISKES first got in touch with LINDEMANNS: At the beginning of 1944, K.P. was told by an agent named HELIS that he knew of a "big man", an "English agent", who had a brother who had been arrested by the S.D. and was in prison in Scheveningen. This man was willing to work for the Allies if his brother was released. The release was arranged by SCHRIJVER and the brother (whose name HUNTEMANN did not know) went to work in Rotterdam. So far as HUNTEMANN knows, he never worked for the G.I.S. but dealt in black market transactions and, in this connection, kept in close touch with K.P. who used to go and visit him frequently at Rotterdam.

The agent, who was known as "CC", then started work for GISKES and was a great success. He was run entirely by GISKES through K.P. and his work was kept absolutely secret.

WURK also spoke to HUNTEMANN of LINDEMANNS as a very important man.

Later, in 1945, HUNTEMANN heard "CC" referred to as KING-KONG.

Information obtained from HUNTEMANN on LINDEMANNS (contd.)

The only time HUNTEMANN had any personal contact with LINDEMANNS was at the end of August 1944 (probably the 29th) when he went from Brussels to Lille with him. LINDEMANNS was to return to Brussels the same day. Very little conversation took place between the two men, as HUNTEMANN had been told by GIESKES that he did not want them to become intimate. The only matters discussed were the point where HUNTEMANN was to be dropped and what was to be done in the event of their being stopped. If they were stopped by the Germans, HUNTEMANN was to do the talking; if by members of the Resistance, LINDEMANNS would deal with the matter, as he knew the password (at this time it was "Vive la Belgique, la Belgique liberee"). HUNTEMANN did not know how LINDEMANNS knew this.

HUNTEMANN did not know of LINDEMANNS crossing the lines more than once, nor had he heard that LINDEMANNS delivered crystals to W/T agents.

He did not know whether LINDEMANNS had been instructed to act as stay-behind agent in Brussels, but KIESEWETTER told him that LINDEMANNS had told him (KIESEWETTER) that he went to the Hotel Metropole where on the 4th floor was a W/T station. HUNTEMANN did not know whether he had been told to do this, but he certainly stayed in Brussels.

Additional Information given by HUNTEMANN on LINDEMANNS

HUNTEMANN was seen in his cell on 2.6.45, and stated that on the Saturday in question KIESEWETTER told him that "CC" had got the information about the air-borne landing at the Hotel Metropole in Brussels. HUNTEMANN does not know how. The area where the landing was to take place was said by KIESEWETTER to be in Westphalia, in a triangle bounded by Muenster, Dueren and another town of which HUNTEMANN does not know the name.

Later, in February 1945, GIESKES told HUNTEMANN that "CC" had actually blown the Arnhem operation.

1. Brigadeführer HARSTER

O.C. of Sicherheitspolizei and S.D. Holland. About the autumn of 1943 and subsequent to his activities in Holland, HARSTER is believed to have taken over a fdo. in Italy. Earlier history unknown.

German (Austrian ?); aged about 40; medium build; weight about 80 kg; fair hair; blue eyes; round face; healthy complexion; clean-shaven; strong, healthy hands; wore S.S. uniform (Brigadeführer); South German accent.

Successor of the above as O.C. Sicherheitspolizei and S.D. Holland. Prior to taking up these duties, in about the autumn of 1943, NAUMANN was employed as O.C. a Sipo section on the Eastern front.

German; aged about 40; medium build; slim; weight about 75 kg; dark hair; healthy complexion; cleanshaven; wore S.S. uniform (Brigadeführer); German with a Saxon accent.

3. Obersturmbannführer DEFFNER

Leiter III of the Sicherheitspolizei and S.D. Holland in 1943 and 1944. A brutal S.D.-man and Nazi; did all he could to further the S.D. at the expense of the Abwehr; untrustworthy and secretive.

German; aged about 30; tall and thin; medium fair hair; thin, narrow face; blue eyes; cleanshaven; nervous-looking and unreliable; wore S.S. uniform; sharp voice.

(from HUNTEMAHN)

German; aged about 30; medium build; about 1.74m.; fair hair; grey eyes; pale complexion; cleanshaven; in uniform; spoke German with accent; brutal.

4. Obersturmbannführer SCHREYER

Leiter of Referat IV.E of the Sicherheitspolizei and S.D. in Holland from 1940-45. Well-intentioned, but often prevented from carrying out promises by DEFFNER. Tried to establish good relations with the Abwehr and was not in entire agreement with the S.D. on many matters. Previously Kriminal-rat in a Lake Constance town.

German; aged about 40; medium build; plump; weight about 75 kg.; reddish complexion, like a drinker; cleanshaven; looks like a small business man; wore S.S. uniform; spoke German with Bodensee accent; last seen 10th August, 1944, at the Hague.

4. Ostarbaf. SCHREYNIER (contd.)

Description: German; aged about 38; small and plump; (from HUNTEMANN) about 1.66m.; light brown hair, very sparse; grey eyes; ruddy complexion; cleanshaven; in uniform; scars on his face, the result of a motor accident; spoke German with Bavarian accent; came from Bregenz-am-Bodensee.

5. Hauptsturmführer KNOOP

Employed as Kommissar with Referat IV. of Sicherheitspolizei and S.D., The Hague. Took up employment there about 1942 and was still there in 1944. A fanatical Nazi and S.D. man, unpleasant in his handling of prisoners and unco-operative towards the Abwehr. A farmer by profession, comes from Westphalia.

Description: German; aged about 28; height 1.85m.; tall, (from GLIESES) athletic; weight about 85 kg.; fair hair; blue eyes; healthy complexion; cleanshaven; looks like a game-keeper; S.S. Uniform.

Description: German; aged about 35; slim; height about (from HUNTEMANN) 1.78m.; light brown hair; grey eyes; cleanshaven; in uniform; very loud, hard voice; spoke German without accent; address unknown, had a farm in the Ruhr.

b) Agents

1. POOS

Employed at the Hague; participated in many S.D. arrests. Was said to have been shot in the autumn of 1944 whilst taking part in an arrest.

Description: Dutch; aged about 40; strong build; height (from HUNTEMANN) about 1.78m.; brown hair; blue eyes; clean-shaven; civilian clothes; spoke Dutch and German.

2. SLACHTER

Employed at The Hague and took part in many arrests by the S.D.

Description: Dutch; aged about 35; heavy build; height (from HUNTEMANN) about 1.78m.; dark brown hair; cleanshaven; civilian clothes; spoke German and Dutch. Seen at various times between 1942 and 1943 at The Hague.

Dear Wilson,

I must apologize for being somewhat dilatory in writing to inform you of the call which was paid upon me by Jack Hughs and Speyer from Camp O2O; I am afraid that ever since they were here I have been rushed off my feet, and had no time to commit myself to paper.

When Hughs and Speyer came, I was able to tell them a little about the sort of thing they might expect during the interrogations of GISKES and HUNTERMANN, but this, however, could only be a brief summary. More importantly I think, I have furnished them with a complete report of the S.O.E. operations in Holland with which these two Germans were concerned. This report gives every detail of agents' identities, missions, dropping bodies etc., etc., and I have also supplied them with the complete set of traffic for which HUNTERMANN and GISKES were jointly responsible. To these I am shortly going to add an appreciation of codes, conventions etc., which were in use at the time; this will be of a fairly non-technical nature, and is being specially written for the purpose by our Signals Directorate. I have also arranged that O2O can refer to me at any time when they may have a query to raise, and Jack Hughs has in fact rung me up this evening to ask how our agents were treated when they were in the prison at Haaren.

I hope that these arrangements will meet with your approval, and feel that really this is the only way of getting the maximum out of these characters, although of course it will mean a considerable amount of work for Hughs and Speyer, which, however, they do not seem to mind.

Oberstleutnant Hermann GISKES @ Dr. GERLARDTS was captured in civilian clothing while hiding in the buildings at Eichl which had been used as the training-school for agents of FAK 307. After a brief preliminary interrogation in the Field he arrived at Camp 020 on the 24th May.

GISKES was put in touch with Ast Hamburg in September 1938 by Major FELDMANN. He began working for the Abwehr in January 1939 in Abteilung III c 1 Ast Hamburg. He was in Abteilung III c 1 until May 1941 when he moved to III F whose main preoccupation at that time was breaking down British Secret Service organisations in Holland. GISKES has given certain details of this which are under investigation. At the outbreak of war he was forming and reorganising Abwehr III sections at Ast Munster, and investigated a French Intelligence Service in Copenhagen. In June 1940 he was transferred to Ast Paris III c 2 until August 1941, being responsible for suspected spy cases in the greater Paris area and adjoining departments.

In August 1941 GISKES was transferred to III F Ast Niederrhein where he had an extremely successful career in penetrating and breaking up Allied resistance organisations; in particular a large circuit of SOE wireless transmitters was operated under his direction.

In January 1944 when the III FAKs and FAKs were created out of the former III F Dienststellen GISKES formed and commanded FAK 307 with its headquarters at Brussels. FAK 307 and the FAKs under its control were, until the German collapse in the Ruhr, very active in training and despatching agents for a variety of missions, many of which combined penetration with espionage targets.

Preliminary investigation indicates that GISKES is providing a mass of useful and accurate information. He gives every appearance of being fully co-operative; it is apparent that he is a bitter enemy of the Gestapo and did all he could not only to save captured Allied agents from ill-treatment but also to try and have their lives spared.
